9		vaccine or immunization passports or other

18		Existing law provides that an institution of

23		1, 2021, provided it offers certain exemptions.

This bill would prohibit an entity, an
institution of education, or business subject to
this bill from discriminating against an individual
who, when covered by this bill, refuses to provide
proof of immunization.

This bill would also provide for a private right of action by an individual injured by a violation of this bill.

Relating to vaccines; to amend Section 1 of Act 2021-493, now appearing as Section 22-11B-5, Code of Alabama 1975; to authorize the Attorney General to pursue civil actions to enjoin a threatened or continuing violation of existing law pertaining to vaccine passports; to prohibit institutions of education from inquiring about a student's vaccination status without parental consent; to prohibit discrimination against an individual based on refusal to provide proof of immunization; and to provide for private rights of action.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Section 1 of Act 2021-493, now appearing as Section 22-11B-5, Code of Alabama 1975, is amended to read as follows:

1 "\\$22-11B-5.

"(a) A state or local government entity, or any of its officers, or agents, or contractors, may not issue vaccine or immunization passports, vaccine or immunization passes, or any other standardized documentation for the purpose of certifying the immunization status of an individual, or otherwise require the publication or sharing of immunization records or similar health information for an individual, except as otherwise required by Chapter 30 of Title 16 or other applicable state law. The Attorney General may commence a civil action to enjoin a threatened or continuing violation of this subsection.

- "(b) A state or local government entity or agency, or any of its officers or agents, may not require an individual to receive an immunization or present documentation of an immunization as a condition for receiving any government service or for entry into a government building, except as otherwise required by Chapter 30 of Title 16 or other applicable state law.
- "(c) <u>Institutions of education may not inquire into</u>
 the vaccination status of a student without parental consent.

 Institutions of education may continue to require a student to prove vaccination status as a condition of attendance only for the specific vaccines that were already required by the institution as of January 1, 2021, provided that the institutions give an exemption for students with a medical condition or religious belief that is contrary to vaccination.

1	"(d) An entity or individual doing business in this		
2	state may not refuse to provide any goods or services, or		
3	refuse to allow admission, to a customer based on		
4	the customer's immunization status or lack of documentation

6	"(e) No entity, institution of education, or		
7	business subject to this section shall discriminate against an

15	Section 2. This act shall become effective on the		
16	first day of the third month following its passage and		

approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
