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21	Relating to the Alabama Literacy Task Force; to amend
22	Section 16-6G-3, Code of Alabama 1975, to provide further for
23	the duties and membership of the task force; to provide for
24	the compensation of members; to provide for the chair and vice
25	chair; and to provide for meetings.
26	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
27	Section 1. Section 16-6G-3 of the Code of Alabama 1975,
28	is amended to read as follows:



29 "\$16-6G-3

30 (a) The State Superintendent of Education shall convene 31 a standing Literacy Task Force by December 1, 2019, to provide 32 recommendations for comprehensive core reading and reading intervention programs, of which the content is age appropriate 33 34 and aligns with the state's standards and code of ethics and 35 reflects the core values of the state; a state continuum of 36 teacher development for approved science of reading pursuant to subsection (e) of Section $16-6G-6_{\tau}$; and an annual list of 37 vetted and approved assessments that are valid and reliable 38 39 reading screening, formative, and diagnostic assessment systems for selection and use by local education agencies. The 40 41 task force shall meet in regular session at least twice a 42 year. The vetted list of assessments shall be valid for a 43 period of five years, beginning with the list finalized by the State Superintendent of Education for the 2021-2022 school 44 45 year. Assessments may be added during that time period, but 46 not removed. The task force shall make public all rubrics and 47 measurements used to determine eligibility and compliance for 48 all assessments that applied for consideration. All appointing 49 authorities shall coordinate their appointments so that 50 diversity of gender, race, and geographical areas is 51 reflective of the makeup of this state. The State Department 52 of Education shall verify that each appointee satisfies the 53 credentials under which he or she was appointed. The membership of the task force shall include all of the 54 following appointees, each of whom shall have at least three 55 56 years of experience with scientifically based reading



57	instruction:
58	(1) Two public K-12 teachers appointed by the Executive
59	Director of the Alabama Education Association.
60	(1) The State Superintendent of Education or his or her
61	designee.
62	(2) The Director of the Alabama Reading Initiative.
63	(3) Eight members, consisting of four classroom
64	teachers who teach in grades 7-12 and four classroom teachers
65	who teach in grades K-6, who are each appointed from a
66	different State Board of Education district by the State Board
67	of Education, from nominations made by local superintendents
68	of education serving in those districts and submitted to the
69	State Superintendent of Education.
70	(4) Four members who are either classroom teachers or
71	public K-12 administrators, who are appointed by the State
72	Board of Education from the state at large, from
73	recommendations made by local superintendents of education and
74	submitted to the State Superintendent of Education.
75	(2) (5) One public K-12 special education teacher
76	appointed by the State Superintendent of Education.
77	(3)(6) Three Certified Academic Dyslexia Therapists,
78	who have been certified for a minimum of three years,
79	appointed by the Alabama Branch of the International Dyslexia
80	Association.
81	(4) Two public school principals appointed by the
82	Executive Director of the Council for Leaders in Alabama
83	Schools.
84	(5) One local superintendent of education appointed by

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85	the Executive Director of the School Superintendents of
86	Alabama.
87	(6) One local board of education member appointed by
88	the Alabama Association of School Boards.
89	(7) One national expert in literacy member appointed by
90	the State Superintendent of Education.
91	(8) One early childhood educator appointed by the
92	Secretary of the Alabama Department of Early Childhood
93	Education.
94	(9) One dean of a college of education appointed by the
95	Alabama Commission on Higher Education.
96	(10) Seven additional members, four <u>Four members</u>
97	appointed by the Governor and three by the State
98	Superintendent of Education.
99	(b) Members appointed to the task force shall be
100	appointed to serve a two-year term and may be reappointed to
101	serve one additional two-year term.
102	(c) The members of the task force shall be reimbursed
103	through the department for expenses incurred in the
104	performance of their duties for the task force in the same
105	manner and at the same rate as is provided for state
106	employees. Subject to appropriations, nothing in this chapter
107	shall limit payment for their service.
108	(1) The Director of the Alabama Reading Initiative
109	shall serve as chair, and a vice chair shall be elected by the
110	membership of the task force. If the position of director is
111	vacant, the vice chair shall serve as chair until the State
112	Superintendent of Education appoints a new director.

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113	(2) The task force shall meet at least twice a year.
114	The task force shall set meeting dates and times, set agendas,
115	vote, and develop recommendations for the State Board of
116	Education in collaboration with the State Department of
117	Education. All task force meetings and subcommittee meetings
118	shall be publicly posted along with a complete listing of all
119	task force members.
120	(b) Each approved(d) An assessment system shall do
121	shall be vetted if the assessment does all of the following:
122	(1) <u>Provide</u> Provides screening and diagnostic
123	capabilities for monitoring student progress.
124	(2) <u>Measure</u> <u>Measures</u> , at a minimum, phonological
125	awareness, oral language, the alphabetic principle, including
126	letter naming, letter sound, and sound letter correspondences,
127	decoding, encoding, accuracy, vocabulary, and comprehension.
128	(3) <u>Identify</u> Identifies students who have a reading
129	deficiency, including identifying students with
130	characteristics of dyslexia.
131	(4) Provides predictive validity with regard to the
132	state summative assessment.
133	(c) In determining which assessment systems to approve
134	for use by local education agencies, the task force, at a
135	minimum, shall also consider all of the following factors:
136	(1) The time required to conduct the assessments, with
137	the intention of minimizing the impact on instructional time.
138	(2) The level of integration of assessment results with
139	instructional support for teachers and students.
140	(3) The timeliness in reporting assessment results to

- 142 Section 2. This act shall become effective immediately
- 143 following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its
