4	SYNOPSIS:
5	Under existing law, a nonviable birth that
6	occurs before the twentieth week of gestation is not
7	reported to the Office of Vital Statistics, and a
8	parent of a nonviable birth that occurs before the
9	twentieth week of gestation may not request a
10	certificate of birth.
11	Also under existing law, a parent of a fetal
12	death occurring after 20 weeks of gestation may request
13	a Certificate of Birth Resulting in Stillbirth.
14	This bill would create the Genesis Act to
15	require the Alabama Department of Public Health to
16	adopt rules allowing for the parents of a nonviable
17	birth occurring before the twentieth week of gestation
18	to request a Certificate of Nonviable Birth.

21	A BILL
22	TO BE ENTITLED
23	AN ACT

25	Relating to the Alabama Department of Public Health; to
26	adopt the Genesis Act; to require the Department of Health to
27	establish a Certificate of Nonviable Birth form to issue to
28	parents, upon request, for certain nonviable births.



29 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

30 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as 31 the Genesis Act.

32 Section 2. The Alabama Department of Public Health 33 shall issue, upon request, a Certificate of Nonviable Birth to 34 a parent or parents of a nonviable birth occurring before 20 35 weeks of gestation. The department, by rule, shall establish a 36 standard form and a process under which a parent may request a 37 certificate. The department may require a health care professional to complete and sign a form verifying the 38 39 nonviable birth as a prerequisite to issuing a certificate. Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first 40 day of the third month following its passage and approval by 41

42 the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
