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4 HR _____ HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF RETIRED UNITED STATES
5 MARINE CORPS MAJOR GENERAL JEROME GARY COOPER.

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7 WHEREAS, with profound regret and sorrow, we note the 8 death on April 27, 2024, of former Alabama State 9 Representative and retired United States Marine Corps Major 10 General Jerome Gary Cooper; his passing leaves a void in the 11 lives of his loving family, many friends, and the community 12 at large, where he was highly regarded; and

13 WHEREAS, Jerome Gary Cooper was born on October 2,
14 1936, in Lafayette, Louisiana, to Algernon J. Cooper, Sr.
15 and Gladys Mouton Cooper, the oldest of six children; and

WHEREAS, he received his Bachelor of Science in 16 17 Finance from the University of Notre Dame and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps upon 18 19 graduation in June 1958; following graduation from The Basic School, he initially reported for duty with the 1st Marine 20 Brigade in Hawaii; General Cooper served on active duty for 21 22 12 years, commanding a number of units, including the Marine Detachment aboard the Guided Missile Cruiser Chicago; in 23 24 1967, he became the first Black officer in the Marine Corps 25 to lead an infantry company into combat, a fact which is noted in the historical calendar of the Corps; and 26

27 WHEREAS, in Vietnam, General Cooper earned a number 28 of decorations for heroism including the Bronze Star, two

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29 Purple Hearts for wounds received in ground action, and the 30 Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry three times; his other 31 military decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal 32 and the Legion of Merit; and

33 WHEREAS, he joined the Individual Ready Reserve in January 1970; as a reservist, he commanded the 13th Force 34 35 Reconnaissance Company in Mobile, the 4th Battalion, 14th Marines, 4th Marine Division, and a number of other 36 37 mobilization assignments including Commanding General, 38 Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina; in 1988, he was promoted to Major General and returned to active duty as 39 Director of Personnel, Headquarters, United States Marine 40 41 Corps; he retired from the Corps in 1996; and

42 WHEREAS, in 1974, General Cooper was elected to the 43 Alabama House of Representatives; he was one of the first African-Americans since the Reconstruction era elected to 44 45 the Legislature from South Alabama; he was reelected in 1978 46 but resigned to serve in the Governor's Cabinet as Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Human Resources; 47 in this cabinet position, Commissioner Cooper managed a 48 49 staff of over 4,000 and the largest agency budget in the 50 State of Alabama; and

51 WHEREAS, President Bush, in 1989 appointed, and the 52 United States Senate confirmed, Mr. Cooper as the Assistant 53 Secretary of the Air Force for Manpower, Reserve Affairs, 54 Installations and the Environment; he participated in the 55 planning of Operation Desert Storm and served throughout the 56 Bush Administration; and

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57 WHEREAS, from 1992 to 1994, Mr. Cooper was the Senior 58 Vice President of David Volkert and Associates, a regional 59 engineering and architectural firm; he also served as Vice 60 President of David Volkert & Associates from 1981 to 1989; 61 and

WHEREAS, in 1994, President Clinton selected Mr. Cooper to serve as the United States Ambassador to Jamaica; upon Senate confirmation, Ambassador Cooper presented his credentials to the Governor General of Jamaica on November 4, 1994; he returned to his home in Mobile, Alabama, in December 1997; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Cooper faithfully served as Chairman of 68 69 CNB Bancorp, Incorporated, until his retirement in 2022; 70 additionally, he served on numerous other boards including 71 the Community Foundation of South Alabama; the American 72 Friends of Jamaica; U.S. Steel, Incorporated; PNC Financial 73 Services, GenCorp.; Protective Life Insurance Company; and 74 the Air University Board of Visitors; Gary was very proud to 75 serve as the Chairman of the Board of Directors for Commonwealth National Bank, the first minority owned 76 77 National Bank in Alabama; and

78 WHEREAS, Mr. Cooper was a member of the Omega Psi Phi 79 Fraternity, 100 Black Men of Greater Mobile, the Montford 80 Point Marine Association, the NAACP Unit 5044, and the 81 Marine Corps League; in addition, he was active in numerous 82 other community organizations, especially those serving 83 youth such as the Hope Boxing Academy; and 84 WHEREAS, Gary Cooper is survived by his loving wife

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85 of 33 years, Beverly Martin Cooper; children, Patrick 86 Charles Cooper, Joli Claire Cooper, and Gladys Shawn Cooper; grandchildren, Sophie Cooper (Dan Fishman), Celia Mouton 87 88 Cooper, Patrick Samuel Cooper, Oliver Cooper, Ashley Harold 89 Cooke III, Alana Marian Nelson, and Anthony Cooper Nelson, Jr.; one beautiful great-granddaughter, Annalise Boaz Cooper 90 91 Fishman; brother, Algernon Cooper, Jr.; sister, Dominique 92 Cooper; special nephew, Christopher Cooper (Amy); and a host of other nieces and nephews, family, and friends; and 93

94 WHEREAS, Major General Jerome Gary Cooper lived a 95 long and productive life and was a valued member of the 96 community, and his presence will be greatly missed; we 97 recognize his selfless dedication to his country and to this 98 great State of Alabama, and his life of service is highly 99 commended; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That the death of Major General Jerome Gary Cooper is recorded with deep sadness, and by copy of this resolution we convey our highest esteem and our heartfelt condolences to his family.
