7 WHEREAS, it is with profound sorrow that we note the 8 death of Gladys Motley Norman, on February 5, 2024, at the 9 age of 84; her passing leaves a void in the lives of her 10 loving family, many friends, and the community where she was 11 highly regarded; and

12 WHEREAS, Gladys Norman was born on March 28, 1939, to 13 Chinney B. Motley and Annie B. Davis in Montgomery, Alabama; 14 she accepted Christ at an early age and was baptized at 15 North Court Street Missionary Baptist Church; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Norman received her early education in 16 the Montgomery School System and graduated from Booker T. 17 Washington High School; she matriculated to Alabama State 18 19 University (ASU) where she earned her Bachelor of Arts in Art History and African American History; she furthered her 20 education by pursuing two Master's degrees, one from Alabama 21 State University in Art and History, and the other from 22 23 Wesley University in Nebraska; additionally, she furthered her education through the Art Institute of Chicago, formerly 24 25 known as the Chicago Institute of Fine Arts; and

26 WHEREAS, upon receiving her bachelor's degree from 27 ASU, she became employed at Fairfield Industrial High School 28 in Fairfield as an Art teacher; she later became one of the

first Black teachers to integrate Jefferson County Schools at Leeds High School; she remained a teacher with Jefferson County at Minor High School for the following 43 years; during her career, she received numerous awards and accolades and was recognized for her work of enhancing the lives of her many students though art, a tool used to transcend cultural barriers; and

36 WHEREAS, she was united in holy matrimony to her 37 loving husband, Theodore Roosevelt Norman, in March of 1965 38 and their union was blessed with two beautiful daughters; 39 Gladys Norman remained devoted to her husband until his 40 death on December 17, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Gladys Norman was most content when surrounded by her family; her love for gardening and creating a beautiful yard full of flowers was legendary; she was a stalwart member of her community and was devoted to her students; and as a result of her generous spirit and pleasant personality, she was loved by many; and
