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1 Enrolled, An Act, 2 3 SJR CONTINUING IN EXISTENCE THE ALABAMA OPIOID OVERDOSE 4 5 AND ADDICTION COUNCIL ESTABLISHED BY EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 708 BY GOVERNOR KAY IVEY. 6 7 8 WHEREAS, substance use disorders and mental illness 9 affect millions of individuals of all ages, races, and ethnic backgrounds, including their families, friends, 10 11 coworkers, and communities; and 12 WHEREAS, more than 25 million Americans have embraced 13 recovery and are actively building stronger communities and 14 better lives, families, and relationships; and 15 WHEREAS, Governor Kay Ivey established the Alabama Opioid Overdose and Addiction Council in 2017 through 16 Executive Order No. 708 to develop a comprehensive and 17 18 coordinated strategic plan to combat Alabama's opioid crisis 19 and reduce the number of deaths and adverse consequences in 20 the state; and 21 WHEREAS, the council and standing committees of the 22 council have remained committed to expanding the state's 23 efforts to fight the opioid crisis through many strategies, including the development of tactics aimed at reducing the 24 25 harmful effects, decreasing overdoses, and improving access 26 to care for those struggling with substance use disorders; 2.7 and

WHEREAS, through this work and various partnerships

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- with the greater recovery community, many lives have been saved; now therefore,
- BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the Legislature continues in
 existence the Alabama Opioid Overdose and Addiction Council
 established by Executive Order No. 708 by Governor Ivey.
- 35 (a) The council's leadership and membership shall
 36 remain, and the council shall continue meeting and studying
 37 the current opioid crisis in this state, monitoring and
 38 evaluating the implementation of the strategic action plan,
 39 and providing periodic updates and recommendations to the
 40 Governor.
- 41 (b) Each non-legislative member of the council may be 42 reimbursed for expenses related to attending meetings, 43 training, and fulfilling council duties. Each legislative member of the council shall be entitled to his or her 44 45 regular legislative compensation, his or her per diem, and 46 travel expenses for each day he or she attends a meeting of the task force. These payments shall be paid out of any 47 funds appropriated to the use of the Legislature by means of 48 49 warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the State Treasury. 50 Notwithstanding the foregoing, no member shall receive additional legislative compensation or per diem when the 51 52 Legislature is in session or if a member is being paid any 53 other payments on the same dates for attendance on other 54 state business.
