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4	SJR MOURNING THE DEATH AND CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF
5	STEPHEN CHARLES SLOAN.

7	WHEREAS, it is with profound sorrow that we note the
8	death of Stephen Charles "Steve" Sloan on April 14, 2024, at
9	the age of 79; and
10	WHEREAS, his passing leaves a void in the lives of
11	his loving family, many friends, and the many communities he
12	called home throughout the United States; and
13	WHEREAS, Steve Sloan was born on August 19, 1944, in
14	Austin, Texas, to C.L. "Preacher" Sloan and Virginia Byrd
15	Sloan; in 1953, his family settled in Cleveland, Tennessee,
16	where Steve was a stand-out athlete on the football and
17	basketball teams of Bradley Central High School; he was
18	All-State as both a quarterback and a guard, winning state
19	championships in both sports his senior year; he was also
20	one of the top prep golfers in the state; and
21	WHEREAS, Steve Sloan attended The University of
22	Alabama where he excelled in both academics and athletics;
23	he was an Academic All-American in 1964 and 1965, majoring
24	in Business and Education; he played defensive back under
25	legendary coach, Paul "Bear" Bryant; he played in the 1964
26	Sugar Bowl against the University of Mississippi with a
27	victorious final score of 12-7 and won the National

Championship Title that year and in 1965; in the 1966 Orange

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29	Bowl, Steve was selected Most Valuable Player; that same
30	year, he was consensus All-American, named MVP in the
31	Southeastern Conference, and won the Sammy Baugh Trophy as
32	the nation's best passer; and in his senior year, he was
33	voted Co-Captain of the 1965 Crimson Tide Football Team; and
3 4	WHEREAS, Steve had a strong faith in Jesus Christ,
35	even as a popular student-athlete; he was a founding member
36	of the Alabama Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA), which
37	is the longest-running college FCA huddle in the United
38	States; he became one of FCA's greatest role models during
39	his career as a Christian coach; he was an outstanding
40	speaker and was invited to speak at worship services and
41	universities across the nation, including an invitation from
42	Billy Graham; and
43	WHEREAS, Steve was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons and
4 4	played as a back-up for two years before returning to his
45	alma mater as a member of Coach Bryant's staff from
46	1968-1970 and golf coach in 1969; his coaching career took
47	off and he became offensive coordinator for Florida State
48	University; under his leadership, the Seminoles led the
49	nation in offense; he also held that position for Georgia
50	Tech before taking his first head coaching job at Vanderbilt
51	University in 1973, becoming the youngest college head
52	football coach in the nation; Vanderbilt University played
53	in their first bowl game since 1955 during his time there;
54	and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year
55	in 1974 and Southwest Conference Coach of the Year in 1976;
56	he continued his highly successful coaching career with

58	to head championship teams and compile records; Steve also
59	mentored junior coaching staff who went on to become
60	successful coaches in their own right; and
61	WHEREAS, Steve returned to The University of Alabama
62	as Athletic Director in 1987; he excelled in this role as
63	well and with his advisement, the most successful football
64	donor program in the nation, Tide Pride, was launched; he
65	also led the expansion of Bryant-Denny Stadium, increasing
66	the seating capacity to 70,123; during his tenure the
67	football team played in the Sugar Bowl, the basketball team
68	gained two berths in the NCAA Tournament, and the gymnastics
69	team won a National Championship; and
70	WHEREAS, Steve was a successful Athletic Director at
71	North Texas State University where he elevated the football
72	program to Division I status; he did the same as the
73	Athletic Director of the University of Central Florida,
74	leading the Golden Knights to 36 Atlantic Sun Conference
75	Championships and 26 NCAA Tournament berths during his
76	nine-year tenure; he continued his success as Athletic
77	Director of the University of Chattanooga, launching that
78	athletic program into a new era of athletic achievements
79	nationally; and
80	WHEREAS, Steve was inducted into the Tennessee Sports
81	Hall of Fame in 2000 and the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in
82	2003; Sports Illustrated selected him as one of the 50
83	Greatest Sports Figures from Tennessee from 1900 to 2000; in
84	2019 he was selected for the Paul W. Bryant Alumni-Athlete



85	Award; he fulfilled a lifelong dream of qualifying for a
86	major golf championship and played in the U.S. Senior Open
87	in Bethesda, Maryland; he authored two books based on his
88	Christian faith and how he used his platform in football to
89	serve Jesus Christ; and he served his country in the United
90	States Air National Guard; and
91	WHEREAS, Steve was preceded in death by his parents;
92	stepmother, Samye Jean Phillips Sloan; and his son, Jonathan
93	Sloan; he will be lovingly remembered by his devoted wife of
94	55 years, Brenda Faw Sloan; and his son, Stephen Sloan, Jr.;

96	WHEREAS, although his presence will be greatly
97	missed, the memory of Steve Sloan will be cherished by all
98	who knew and loved him; now therefore,
99	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
100	HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the death of Stephen Charles
101	"Steve" Sloan is recorded with deep sadness and this
102	resolution is offered in tribute to his life and with
103	heartfelt sympathy to his family, whose grief is shared by
104	many.
