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10 Relating to public education; to create the Restoring 11 Educational Advancement of Completing High School (REACH) Act; 12 to establish a nontraditional high school diploma option, 13 through the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community 14 College System, as an additional pathway through which a 15 student may earn a high school diploma; to provide for the duties of the Alabama Community College System, the State 16 17 Superintendent of Education, and the State Department of 18 Education; to require the Alabama Community College System to 19 annually summarize and report on the effectiveness of the 20 program to the Legislature; to amend Section 16-28-3.1, Code 21 of Alabama 1975, to provide further for the information 22 provided to a student and his or her parents or legal guardian 23 during the exit interview from high school and to require the 24 sharing of data between the State Department of Education and 25 the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community College 26 System regarding students who have withdrawn from high school; and to amend Section 16-28-40, Code of Alabama 1975, to 27 28 include proof of participating in a nontraditional high school



29 diploma option program as a reason to allow an individual 30 under the age of 19 to receive a driver's or learner's 31 license.

32 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

33 Section 1. (a) This section shall be known and may be 34 cited as the Restoring Educational Advancement of Completing 35 High School (REACH) Act.

36 (b) For the purposes of this section, the following 37 terms have the following meanings:

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(1) ACCS. The Alabama Community College System.

39 (2) ADULT EDUCATION. Education programs provided
40 through the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community
41 College System and its approved network of providers.

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(3) DEPARTMENT. The State Department of Education.

43 (4) LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY. A county school system or
44 city school system operating public primary and secondary
45 schools.

46 (5) NONTRADITONAL HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA OPTION. An
47 alternative pathway for earning a high school diploma
48 developed through adult education.

(c) (1) The ACCS, in collaboration with the State Superintendent of Education, shall establish a nontraditional high school diploma option for students who are 18 years of age or older and who have withdrawn from high school before graduating pursuant to Section 16-28-3.1, Code of Alabama 1975, as a means for those students to earn a high school diploma.

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(2) The ACCS shall develop, implement, and continually

57 evaluate the effectiveness of the nontraditional high school 58 diploma option program to ensure that the curricula of the 59 program is aligned with public high school diploma 60 requirements. The ACCS shall also oversee the management and 61 control of each nontraditional high school diploma option 62 program offered.

63 (d) (1) The ACCS, through its network of community and 64 technical colleges, shall work with local education agencies throughout the state to implement the nontraditional high 65 school diploma option at the local level. Local education 66 67 agencies shall actively promote the availability of the nontraditional high school diploma option to at-risk juniors 68 and seniors. Additionally, the Adult Education Division of the 69 70 ACCS, in conjunction with the department, shall oversee a 71 statewide awareness campaign to ensure that students, parents, and educators throughout the state are informed about the 72 73 opportunities and supports available through this program.

74 (2) Adult education providers approved by the ACCS and
75 public high schools may enter into agreements regarding
76 student participation in nontraditional high school diploma
77 options that include, but are not limited to, the following:

a. Location and manner of instructional delivery
including, but not limited to, in-person, virtual, or a
hybrid.

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b. Reasonable accomodations for participants.

c. Appropriate support services for participants.

(e) The ACCS, in collaboration with the department andlocal education agencies, shall track program participation,



85 student retention, and high school diplomas awarded through 86 the nontraditional high school diploma option to measure the 87 effectiveness of the program. Commencing on January 1, 2026, 88 and each January 1 thereafter, the Chancellor of the ACCS 89 shall submit a summary of the information tracked to the 90 Chairs of the House and Senate Education Policy Committees.

91 (f) Students who earn a high school diploma through the 92 nontraditional high school diploma option are eligible for 93 admission to any two-year or four-year institution of higher 94 education in the state; provided, however, each institution 95 shall maintain the ability to set its own admission 96 requirements.

97 (g) The Board of Trustees of the ACCS and the State 98 Board of Education may adopt reasonable rules to implement 99 this section including, but not limited to, the following:

(1) Allowing an increase to the credit ratio for completion of postsecondary level instructional curricula related to career readiness, career pathways, and integrated education and training correlated to industry recognized credentials.

(2) Utilization of the Workforce Innovation and
Opportunity Act; the Title II Adult Education and Family
Literacy Act; and Measurable Skill Gain indicators as
referenced by the United States Department of Education Office
of Community, Technical, and Adult Education to accelerate the
achievement of a high school diploma.

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113	Community College System network of providers as the primary
114	option of choice for students who have withdrawn from high
115	school to complete a high school diploma or its recognized
116	equivalent.
117	Section 2. Sections 16-28-3.1 and 16-28-40 of the Code
118	of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:
119	"§16-28-3.1
120	(a) <u>(1)</u> A child over the age of who is 17 years of age
121	or older may withdraw from public school prior to graduation
122	if both of the following circumstances exist:
123	(1)a. Written consent is granted by the child's parent
124	or legal guardian.
125	(2) b. An exit interview is conducted where the student
126	and the student's parent or legal guardian have been advised
127	that withdrawal from school shall likely reduce the student's
128	future earning potential and increase the student's likelihood
129	of being unemployed in the future. During the exit interview,

the student who is withdrawing from school shall be given information that has been prepared and supplied by the State Department of Education regarding the detrimental impacts and effects of early withdrawal from school along with any available training and employment opportunity programs, provided such information is available.

136 (2) Information provided during an exit interview by a
137 local high school shall include materials describing available
138 adult education programs and services offered by eligible
139 adult education providers. The materials shall include, but
140 not limited to, General Education Diploma (GED) preparation



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141	services, the nontraditional high school diploma option
142	program, and other programs and pathways available for earning
143	industry certifications and credentials. The materials shall
144	be developed by the Adult Education Division of the Alabama
145	Community College System and approved by the State Department
146	of Education. The local high school shall also provide a
147	withdrawing student with a copy of his or her academic
148	records, including his or her current transcript, contact
149	information for available counseling services, and any
150	requested referrals to available adult education programs.
151	(b) The State Department of Education shall work with
152	local public school systems that have the lowest four-year
153	graduation rates. The <u>department</u> State Department of Education
154	shall incorporate specific dropout prevention strategies,
155	target resources, and gather data that will improve graduation
156	rates and educational outcomes in all grades in all public
157	schools. The department State Department of Education shall
158	develop specific methods of targeted intervention or identify
159	appropriate existing methods for local public school systems
160	that have a four-year graduation rate less than the percentage
161	as determined by the State Board of Education. These
162	interventions may include the following:
163	(1) Early intervention for students who fail Algebra I,
164	or any ninth grade reading or math class, and have
165	insufficient credits to be promoted.
166	(2) Alternative education programs designed to reengage
167	dropouts including but not limited to dual enrollment

167 dropouts including, but not limited to, dual enrollment 168 courses at the community college level and participation in



169 the nontraditional high school diploma option.

170 (3) Increased availability of advanced placement171 courses.

(4) Offering full course fee waivers for students who are eligible for free or reduced lunches, when enrolled in dual credit courses.

175 (5) Flexible programs for older students who are176 currently not enrolled.

(6) Comprehensive coaching for middle school and high school students who are below grade level in reading and math or who are at risk due to poor attendance, behavior, or safety issues including, but not limited to, harassment and bullying.

181 (7) Teacher advisories and other supports that are 182 designed to specifically address the needs of those students 183 who are most at risk of dropping out of school by providing 184 opportunities to build positive connections with peers and 185 teachers and providing assistance with course selection, 186 school performance, and completion of graduation requirements. 187 Students who are most at risk of dropping out of school 188 include, but are not limited to, those students who move 189 often, have poor attendance, or have multiple suspensions or 190 discipline issues.

(8) Strategies that are specifically designed to improve high school graduation rates for those teenagers who are at the highest risk of dropping out, including, but not limited to, students in the foster care system, pregnant students, student parents, English as second language students, and students with special educational needs.



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197	(c) The department State Department of Education, in
198	addition to other information and data, shall compile all of
199	the following data to ensure that the dropout prevention
200	program, and local versions of the program, are based upon
201	evidence-based research, are data-driven, and show continuous
202	improvement in all of the following:
203	(1) The total number of high school suspensions related
204	to truancy.
205	(2) The total number of students enrolled in
206	alternative education programs, including the nontraditional
207	high school diploma option.
208	(3) The total number of students who have been
209	reenrolled in programs with flexible schedules or community
210	college programs.
211	(4) The total number of students who have failed
212	Algebra I or ninth grade reading or math.
213	(5) The total number of students who are repeating the
214	ninth grade.
215	(6) The total number of students receiving remedial
216	assistance in the ninth grade.
217	(d) The department State Department of Education shall
218	prepare and submit to the Legislature a written report that
219	documents all of the following:
220	(1) The outcomes of the dropout prevention strategies
221	to date, at the local school system level.
222	(2) Any planned modification of school system dropout
223	prevention strategies and activities, based on the data
224	compiled.



225 (e) Each local education agency shall report to the 226 State Department of Education, on a quarterly or more frequent 227 basis, student withdrawal data. This data shall include 228 specific information regarding the names and number of 229 students who have withdrawn from each school district. The 230 State Department of Education shall enter into a data sharing 231 agreement with the Adult Education Division of the Alabama 232 Community College System so this data may be accessed as 233 needed."

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235 (a) The Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency shall deny a driver's license or a learner's license for the operation of 236 237 a motor vehicle to any individual under the age of 19 who does 238 not, at the time of application, present a diploma or other 239 certificate of graduation issued to the individual from a secondary high school of this state or any other state, or 240 241 documentation that the individual satisfies one of the 242 following:

(1) The individual is enrolled and making satisfactory
progress in a nontraditional high school diploma option
program or a course leading to a general educational
development certificate (GED) from a state approved
institution or organization, or has obtained the certificate.

(2) The individual is enrolled in a secondary school of this state or any other state and has not at the time of application accumulated disciplinary points while a student in school that would extend the age of eligibility for the student to apply for a driver's license.



(3) The individual is participating in a job trainingprogram approved by the State Superintendent of Education.

255 (4) The individual is gainfully and substantially 256 employed.

257 (5) The individual is a parent with the care and 258 custody of a minor or unborn child.

(6) A physician certifies that the parents of the individual depend on him or her as their sole source of transportation.

(7) The individual is exempted from this requirement
due to circumstances beyond his or her control as provided in
this chapter.

265 (b) (1) The attendance officer or chief attendance 266 administrator, upon request, shall provide documentation of 267 enrollment status and disciplinary points on a form approved 268 by the State Department of Education to any student 15 years 269 of age or older who is properly enrolled in a school under the 270 jurisdiction of the official, for presentation to the Alabama 271 State Law Enforcement Agency, on application for, or renewal 272 or reinstatement of, a driver's license or a learner's license 273 to operate a motor vehicle.

(2) Upon the request of a student seeking a fee
exemption on the basis of his or her homelessness, the staff
member designated to act as the local educational agency
liaison for homeless children and youth, pursuant to 42 U.S.C.
§ 11432(g)(1)(J)(ii), shall provide documentation that the
student is a qualified student, on a form approved by the
State Department of Education, for presentation to the Alabama



281 State Law Enforcement Agency, on application for, or renewal, 282 reinstatement, or replacement of a driver's license. The term 283 "qualified student" refers to a student who the local 284 educational agency liaison for homeless children and youth 285 verifies as meeting the definition of a "homeless child or 286 youth" as provided by 42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2) and whose 287 enrollment status and disciplinary points have been documented 288 pursuant to subdivision (1).

(3) Whenever a student 16 years of age or older
withdraws from school, the attendance officer or chief
attendance administrator shall notify the Alabama State Law
Enforcement Agency of the withdrawal. Withdrawal shall be
defined as more than 10 consecutive or 15 days total unexcused
absences during a single semester.

(c) Within five days of receipt of a notice of withdrawal, the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency shall send notice to the licensee that his or her driver's license or learner's license will be suspended under this article on the 30th day following the date the notice was sent unless documentation of compliance with this article is received by the agency before the 30th day.

(d) Whenever the withdrawal from school of the student, or the failure of the student to enroll in a course leading to or to obtain a GED or high school diploma, is beyond the control of the student, or is for the purpose of transfer to another school as confirmed in writing by the parent or guardian of the student, or is for the purpose of participating in a job training program approved by the State

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309 Superintendent of Education, no notice shall be sent by the 310 proper school official to the Alabama State Law Enforcement 311 Agency to suspend the license of the student. If the student 312 is applying for or renewing a driver's license or a learner's 313 license, the attendance officer or chief attendance 314 administrator, upon request, shall provide the student with 315 documentation to present to the Alabama State Law Enforcement 316 Agency to exempt the student from this section. The local 317 superintendent of education with the assistance of the county or city school attendance director as the case may be, and any 318 319 other staff or school personnel, or the appropriate school official of any private secondary school, shall be the sole 320 321 judge of whether the withdrawal is due to circumstances beyond 322 the control of the individual. Suspension or expulsion from 323 school or imprisonment in a jail or penitentiary is not a circumstance beyond the control of $\frac{1}{2}$ an individual. 324

325 (e) (1) Any individual over the age of 14 who is 326 convicted of the crime of possession of a pistol on the 327 premises of a public school, or a public school bus, or both, 328 under Section 13A-11-72 shall be denied issuance of a driver's 329 permit or license for the operation of a motor vehicle for 180 330 days from the date the individual is eligible and applies for 331 a permit or license for the operation of a motor vehicle. Any 332 adjudication as a juvenile delinguent or youthful offender 333 where the underlying charge is the possession of a pistol on 334 the premises of a public school, or a public school bus, or both, under Section 13A-11-72 shall be considered a conviction 335 336 under this subsection, and the adjudication of an individual



337 as a juvenile delinquent or youthful offender where the 338 underlying charge is a violation under Section 13A-11-72 shall 339 be reported to the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency.

340 (2) If an individual over the age of 14 years possesses a driver's license on the date of conviction, the Alabama 341 342 State Law Enforcement Agency, within five days of receipt of a notice of conviction from the court, shall send notice to the 343 344 licensee that his or her driver's license will be suspended. 345 The notice shall state that the license will be suspended for 180 days commencing on the 30th day following the date the 346 347 notice was sent unless documentation is received by the agency before the 30th day that the individual was not convicted of 348 349 the crime. Upon the appropriate date, the agency shall suspend 350 the license.

351 (3) Upon the written request of the individual whose 352 license is denied or suspended, the Alabama State Law 353 Enforcement Agency shall afford the individual an opportunity 354 for a hearing in the same manner and under the procedure used 355 for other driver license suspensions. If the suspension or 356 denial of issuance determination is sustained by the Secretary 357 of the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency or the authorized 358 agent of the secretary, upon such hearing, the individual may 359 file a petition in the appropriate court to review the final 360 order of suspension or denial by the secretary or the 361 authorized agent of the secretary in the same manner and under the same conditions as is provided in the case of suspensions 362 and denials. 363

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(4) If the conviction is reversed within the 180-day



365 period, the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency, upon receipt 366 of notice of the reversal from the Administrative Office of 367 Courts, shall reinstate a suspended license and shall accept 368 an application for a license and shall issue the license 369 according to law and regulation.

370 (5) The court shall notify the Alabama State Law 371 Enforcement Agency of the conviction of an individual over the 372 age of 14 of a crime involving the possession of a pistol on 373 the premises of a public school, or a public school bus, or both, under Section 13A-11-72 and any reversal of the 374 375 conviction. The Administrative Office of Courts may promulgate adopt necessary rules and regulations to implement this 376 377 notification procedure."

378 Section 3. This act shall become effective on June 1, 379 2025.
