1 Enrolled, An Act,

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3 Relating to public education; to create the Restoring 4 Educational Advancement of Completing High School (REACH) Act; 5 to establish a nontraditional high school diploma option, through the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community 6 7 College System, as an additional pathway through which a student may earn a high school diploma; to provide for the 8 9 duties of the Alabama Community College System, the State Superintendent of Education, and the State Department of 10 11 Education; to require the Alabama Community College System to annually summarize and report on the effectiveness of the 12 13 program to the Legislature; to amend Section 16-28-3.1, Code 14 of Alabama 1975, to provide further for the information 15 provided to a student and his or her parents or legal guardian during the exit interview from high school and to require the 16 17 sharing of data between the State Department of Education and 18 the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community College 19 System regarding students who have withdrawn from high school; 20 and to amend Section 16-28-40, Code of Alabama 1975, to 21 include proof of participating in a nontraditional high school 22 diploma option program as a reason to allow an individual 23 under the age of 19 to receive a driver's or learner's 24 license.

25 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

26 Section 1. (a) This section shall be known and may be 27 cited as the Restoring Educational Advancement of Completing 28 High School (REACH) Act.



29 (b) For the purposes of this section, the following 30 terms have the following meanings:

(1) ACCS. The Alabama Community College System. 31 32 (2) ADULT EDUCATION. Education programs provided 33 through the Adult Education Division of the Alabama Community 34 College System and its approved network of providers.

(3) DEPARTMENT. The State Department of Education. 36 (4) LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY. A county school system or 37 city school system operating public primary and secondary 38 schools.

39 (5) NONTRADITONAL HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA OPTION. An alternative pathway for earning a high school diploma 40 41 developed through adult education.

(c)(1) The ACCS, in collaboration with the State 42 43 Superintendent of Education, shall establish a nontraditional high school diploma option for students who are 18 years of 44 age or older and who have withdrawn from high school before 45 46 graduating pursuant to Section 16-28-3.1, Code of Alabama 47 1975, as a means for those students to earn a high school 48 diploma.

49 (2) The ACCS shall develop, implement, and continually 50 evaluate the effectiveness of the nontraditional high school 51 diploma option program to ensure that the curricula of the 52 program is aligned with public high school diploma 53 requirements. The ACCS shall also oversee the management and 54 control of each nontraditional high school diploma option 55 program offered.

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(d) (1) The ACCS, through its network of community and



57 technical colleges, shall work with local education agencies 58 throughout the state to implement the nontraditional high 59 school diploma option at the local level. Local education 60 agencies shall actively promote the availability of the nontraditional high school diploma option to at-risk juniors 61 62 and seniors. Additionally, the Adult Education Division of the 63 ACCS, in conjunction with the department, shall oversee a 64 statewide awareness campaign to ensure that students, parents, 65 and educators throughout the state are informed about the opportunities and supports available through this program. 66

67 (2) Adult education providers approved by the ACCS and
68 public high schools may enter into agreements regarding
69 student participation in nontraditional high school diploma
70 options that include, but are not limited to, the following:

a. Location and manner of instructional delivery
including, but not limited to, in-person, virtual, or a
hybrid.

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b. Reasonable accomodations for participants.

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c. Appropriate support services for participants.

(e) (1) A student who withdraws from high school, and, within one year after withdrawing enrolls in a nontraditional high school diploma option program, may not be counted as a dropout for purposes of the graduation rate calculations of his or her high school on the State Report Card.

81 (2) The ACCS, in collaboration with the department and
82 local education agencies, shall track program participation,
83 student retention, and high school diplomas awarded through
84 the nontraditional high school diploma option to measure the



effectiveness of the program. Commencing on January 1, 2026, and each January 1 thereafter, the Chancellor of the ACCS shall submit a summary of the information tracked to the Chairs of the House and Senate Education Policy Committees.
(f) Students who earn a high school diploma through the

90 nontraditional high school diploma option are eligible for 91 admission to any two-year or four-year institution of higher 92 education in the state; provided, however, each institution 93 shall maintain the ability to set its own admission 94 requirements.

95 (g) The Board of Trustees of the ACCS and the State
96 Board of Education may adopt reasonable rules to implement
97 this section including, but not limited to, the following:

98 (1) Allowing an increase to the credit ratio for 99 completion of postsecondary level instructional curricula 100 related to career readiness, career pathways, and integrated 101 education and training correlated to industry recognized 102 credentials.

(2) Utilization of the Workforce Innovation and
Opportunity Act; the Title II Adult Education and Family
Literacy Act; and Measurable Skill Gain indicators as
referenced by the United States Department of Education Office
of Community, Technical, and Adult Education to accelerate the
achievement of a high school diploma.

109 (3) Agreed upon state strategies to reduce the dropout 110 rate by using the Adult Education Division of the Alabama 111 Community College System network of providers as the primary 112 option of choice for students who have withdrawn from high



113 school to complete a high school diploma or its recognized 114 equivalent. Section 2. Sections 16-28-3.1 and 16-28-40 of the Code 115 116 of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows: 117 "§16-28-3.1 118 (a) (1) A child over the age of who is 17 years of age 119 or older may withdraw from public school prior to graduation 120 if both of the following circumstances exist: (1)a. Written consent is granted by the child's parent 121 or legal guardian. 122 123 (2)b. An exit interview is conducted where the student and the student's parent or legal guardian have been advised 124 125 that withdrawal from school shall likely reduce the student's 126 future earning potential and increase the student's likelihood 127 of being unemployed in the future. During the exit interview, the student who is withdrawing from school shall be given 128 129 information that has been prepared and supplied by the State 130 Department of Education regarding the detrimental impacts and 131 effects of early withdrawal from school along with any 132 available training and employment opportunity programs, 133 provided such information is available. 134 (2) Information provided during an exit interview by a 135 local high school shall include materials describing available 136 adult education programs and services offered by eligible 137 adult education providers. The materials shall include, but 138 not limited to, General Education Diploma (GED) preparation services, the nontraditional high school diploma option 139 140 program, and other programs and pathways available for earning



141 industry certifications and credentials. The materials shall 142 be developed by the Adult Education Division of the Alabama 143 Community College System and approved by the State Department 144 of Education. The local high school shall also provide a 145 withdrawing student with a copy of his or her academic 146 records, including his or her current transcript, contact 147 information for available counseling services, and any 148 requested referrals to available adult education programs.

149 (b) The State Department of Education shall work with 150 local public school systems that have the lowest four-year 151 graduation rates. The department State Department of Education 152 shall incorporate specific dropout prevention strategies, 153 target resources, and gather data that will improve graduation 154 rates and educational outcomes in all grades in all public 155 schools. The department State Department of Education shall 156 develop specific methods of targeted intervention or identify 157 appropriate existing methods for local public school systems 158 that have a four-year graduation rate less than the percentage 159 as determined by the State Board of Education. These 160 interventions may include the following:

(1) Early intervention for students who fail Algebra I, or any ninth grade reading or math class, and have insufficient credits to be promoted.

164 (2) Alternative education programs designed to reengage
165 dropouts including, but not limited to, dual enrollment
166 courses at the community college level and participation in
167 the nontraditional high school diploma option.

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(3) Increased availability of advanced placement



169 courses.

(4) Offering full course fee waivers for students who are eligible for free or reduced lunches, when enrolled in dual credit courses.

173 (5) Flexible programs for older students who are174 currently not enrolled.

(6) Comprehensive coaching for middle school and high school students who are below grade level in reading and math or who are at risk due to poor attendance, behavior, or safety issues including, but not limited to, harassment and bullying.

179 (7) Teacher advisories and other supports that are 180 designed to specifically address the needs of those students 181 who are most at risk of dropping out of school by providing 182 opportunities to build positive connections with peers and 183 teachers and providing assistance with course selection, 184 school performance, and completion of graduation requirements. 185 Students who are most at risk of dropping out of school 186 include, but are not limited to, those students who move 187 often, have poor attendance, or have multiple suspensions or 188 discipline issues.

(8) Strategies that are specifically designed to improve high school graduation rates for those teenagers who are at the highest risk of dropping out, including, but not limited to, students in the foster care system, pregnant students, student parents, English as second language students, and students with special educational needs.

195 (c) The <u>department</u> <u>State Department of Education</u>, in
196 addition to other information and data, shall compile all of



197 the following data to ensure that the dropout prevention 198 program, and local versions of the program, are based upon 199 evidence-based research, are data-driven, and show continuous 200 improvement in all of the following: 201 (1) The total number of high school suspensions related 202 to truancy. 203 (2) The total number of students enrolled in 204 alternative education programs, including the nontraditional 205 high school diploma option. (3) The total number of students who have been 206 207 reenrolled in programs with flexible schedules or community college programs. 208 209 (4) The total number of students who have failed 210 Algebra I or ninth grade reading or math. 211 (5) The total number of students who are repeating the 212 ninth grade. (6) The total number of students receiving remedial 213 assistance in the ninth grade. 214 215 (d) The department State Department of Education shall 216 prepare and submit to the Legislature a written report that 217 documents all of the following: 218 (1) The outcomes of the dropout prevention strategies 219 to date, at the local school system level. 220 (2) Any planned modification of school system dropout 221 prevention strategies and activities, based on the data 222 compiled. 223 (e) Each local education agency shall report to the State Department of Education, on a quarterly or more frequent 224



225 basis, student withdrawal data. This data shall include specific information regarding the names and number of 226 227 students who have withdrawn from each school district. The 228 State Department of Education shall enter into a data sharing 229 agreement with the Adult Education Division of the Alabama 230 Community College System so this data may be accessed as 231 needed." 232 "\$16-28-40 233 (a) The Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency shall deny 234 a driver's license or a learner's license for the operation of

a motor vehicle to any individual under the age of 19 who does not, at the time of application, present a diploma or other certificate of graduation issued to the individual from a secondary high school of this state or any other state, or documentation that the individual satisfies one of the following:

(1) The individual is enrolled and making satisfactory
progress in a nontraditional high school diploma option
program or a course leading to a general educational
development certificate (GED) from a state approved
institution or organization, or has obtained the certificate.

(2) The individual is enrolled in a secondary school of this state or any other state and has not at the time of application accumulated disciplinary points while a student in school that would extend the age of eligibility for the student to apply for a driver's license.

(3) The individual is participating in a job trainingprogram approved by the State Superintendent of Education.



253 (4) The individual is gainfully and substantially 254 employed.

(5) The individual is a parent with the care and custody of a minor or unborn child.

(6) A physician certifies that the parents of the individual depend on him or her as their sole source of transportation.

260 (7) The individual is exempted from this requirement 261 due to circumstances beyond his or her control as provided in 262 this chapter.

263 (b) (1) The attendance officer or chief attendance administrator, upon request, shall provide documentation of 264 265 enrollment status and disciplinary points on a form approved 266 by the State Department of Education to any student 15 years 267 of age or older who is properly enrolled in a school under the jurisdiction of the official, for presentation to the Alabama 268 269 State Law Enforcement Agency, on application for, or renewal 270 or reinstatement of, a driver's license or a learner's license 271 to operate a motor vehicle.

272 (2) Upon the request of a student seeking a fee 273 exemption on the basis of his or her homelessness, the staff 274 member designated to act as the local educational agency 275 liaison for homeless children and youth, pursuant to 42 U.S.C. 276 § 11432(g)(1)(J)(ii), shall provide documentation that the 277 student is a qualified student, on a form approved by the State Department of Education, for presentation to the Alabama 278 State Law Enforcement Agency, on application for, or renewal, 279 280 reinstatement, or replacement of a driver's license. The term



"qualified student" refers to a student who the local educational agency liaison for homeless children and youth verifies as meeting the definition of a "homeless child or youth" as provided by 42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2) and whose enrollment status and disciplinary points have been documented pursuant to subdivision (1).

(3) Whenever a student 16 years of age or older
withdraws from school, the attendance officer or chief
attendance administrator shall notify the Alabama State Law
Enforcement Agency of the withdrawal. Withdrawal shall be
defined as more than 10 consecutive or 15 days total unexcused
absences during a single semester.

(c) Within five days of receipt of a notice of withdrawal, the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency shall send notice to the licensee that his or her driver's license or learner's license will be suspended under this article on the 30th day following the date the notice was sent unless documentation of compliance with this article is received by the agency before the 30th day.

300 (d) Whenever the withdrawal from school of the student, 301 or the failure of the student to enroll in a course leading to 302 or to obtain a GED or high school diploma, is beyond the 303 control of the student, or is for the purpose of transfer to 304 another school as confirmed in writing by the parent or 305 guardian of the student, or is for the purpose of 306 participating in a job training program approved by the State Superintendent of Education, no notice shall be sent by the 307 308 proper school official to the Alabama State Law Enforcement



309 Agency to suspend the license of the student. If the student 310 is applying for or renewing a driver's license or a learner's 311 license, the attendance officer or chief attendance 312 administrator, upon request, shall provide the student with 313 documentation to present to the Alabama State Law Enforcement 314 Agency to exempt the student from this section. The local 315 superintendent of education with the assistance of the county 316 or city school attendance director as the case may be, and any 317 other staff or school personnel, or the appropriate school official of any private secondary school, shall be the sole 318 319 judge of whether the withdrawal is due to circumstances beyond the control of the individual. Suspension or expulsion from 320 321 school or imprisonment in a jail or penitentiary is not a circumstance beyond the control of a an individual. 322

323 (e) (1) Any individual over the age of 14 who is 324 convicted of the crime of possession of a pistol on the 325 premises of a public school, or a public school bus, or both, 326 under Section 13A-11-72 shall be denied issuance of a driver's 327 permit or license for the operation of a motor vehicle for 180 328 days from the date the individual is eligible and applies for 329 a permit or license for the operation of a motor vehicle. Any 330 adjudication as a juvenile delinquent or youthful offender 331 where the underlying charge is the possession of a pistol on 332 the premises of a public school, or a public school bus, or 333 both, under Section 13A-11-72 shall be considered a conviction 334 under this subsection, and the adjudication of an individual as a juvenile delinquent or youthful offender where the 335 336 underlying charge is a violation under Section 13A-11-72 shall



337 be reported to the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency.

338 (2) If an individual over the age of 14 years possesses 339 a driver's license on the date of conviction, the Alabama 340 State Law Enforcement Agency, within five days of receipt of a notice of conviction from the court, shall send notice to the 341 342 licensee that his or her driver's license will be suspended. 343 The notice shall state that the license will be suspended for 344 180 days commencing on the 30th day following the date the 345 notice was sent unless documentation is received by the agency before the 30th day that the individual was not convicted of 346 347 the crime. Upon the appropriate date, the agency shall suspend the license. 348

349 (3) Upon the written request of the individual whose 350 license is denied or suspended, the Alabama State Law 351 Enforcement Agency shall afford the individual an opportunity 352 for a hearing in the same manner and under the procedure used 353 for other driver license suspensions. If the suspension or 354 denial of issuance determination is sustained by the Secretary 355 of the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency or the authorized 356 agent of the secretary, upon such hearing, the individual may 357 file a petition in the appropriate court to review the final 358 order of suspension or denial by the secretary or the 359 authorized agent of the secretary in the same manner and under 360 the same conditions as is provided in the case of suspensions 361 and denials.

362 (4) If the conviction is reversed within the 180-day
363 period, the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency, upon receipt
364 of notice of the reversal from the Administrative Office of



365 Courts, shall reinstate a suspended license and shall accept 366 an application for a license and shall issue the license 367 according to law and regulation.

368 (5) The court shall notify the Alabama State Law 369 Enforcement Agency of the conviction of an individual over the 370 age of 14 of a crime involving the possession of a pistol on 371 the premises of a public school τ or a public school bus, or 372 both, under Section 13A-11-72 and any reversal of the 373 conviction. The Administrative Office of Courts may promulgate adopt necessary rules and regulations to implement this 374 375 notification procedure." Section 3. This act shall become effective on June 1, 376
