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4	SYNOPSIS:
5	Under existing law, the ReEngage Alabama Grant
6	Program administered by the Alabama Commission on
7	Higher Education provides grant award payments to adult
8	learners pursuing a first associate or baccalaureate
9	degree to assist them in earning short-term
10	credentials.
11	This bill would decrease the minimum age of an
12	adult learner from 25 to 22 years of age and older.
13	This bill would also include as an eligible
14	student an individual who, in addition to other
15	specific criteria, has not previously received a grant
16	award and is pursuing a first baccalaureate degree
17	following a two-year stop-out period after receiving
18	his or her first associate degree.

22	TO BE ENTITLED
23	AN ACT
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25	Relating to the Alabama Commission on Higher Educatio
26	and the ReEngage Alabama Grant Program; to amend Sections
27	16-33D-3 and 16-33D-6, Code of Alabama 1975, to decrease the
28	minimum age of an adult learner from 25 to 22 years of age and

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29 older; and to provide further for the definition of an 30 eligible student. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 31 32 Section 1. Sections 16-33D-3 and 16-33D-6 of the Code 33 of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows: "§16-33D-3 34 35 For the purposes of this chapter, the following terms 36 have the following meanings: 37 (1) ACADEMIC TERM. A portion of an academic year, such as a quarter or semester, during which an institution of 38 39 higher education holds classes including, but not limited to, Fall, Winter, Spring, or Summer semesters. 40 41 (2) ADULT LEARNER. An individual who is 25 22 years of 42 age or older and returning to college. 43 (3) ALABAMA RESIDENT. An individual who has been classified as an in-state resident by an authorized 44 45 institution, who has established residency within this state 46 for at least a 12-month period prior to the beginning of the 47 term for which financial assistance is requested, and who is 48 in this state for other than a temporary purpose. 49 (4) APPROVED INSTITUTION. A state-supported institution 50 of higher education or a private nonprofit institution of 51 higher education that satisfies all of the following: 52 a. Is accredited by the Southern Association of 53 Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, or the Council on 54 Occupational Education. b. Is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid 55 56 program funds.

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57 c. Maintains its primary headquarters in Alabama.

58 (5) AUTHORIZED INSTITUTION. An approved institution
59 that files a signed agreement with the commission to comply
60 with all rules and procedures of the ReEngage Alabama Grant
61 Program as provided by the commission.

62 (6) COMMISSION. The Alabama Commission on Higher63 Education.

64 (7) CONTINUOUS ENROLLMENT. When an adult learner is
65 making academic progress toward degree completion without a
66 stop-out in enrollment of more than one consecutive semester
67 or quarter, such as Fall/Winter to Spring, Spring to
68 Summer/Fall, or Summer to Fall.

69 (8) ELIGIBLE PROGRAM. A nonsectarian, secular
70 educational program that is aligned with Alabama's high demand
71 workforce needs adopted by the Alabama Committee on
72 Credentialing and Career Pathways.

73 (9) ELIGIBLE STUDENT. An individual who completed the 74 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), who is in 75 pursuit of his or her first associate or first baccalaureate 76 degree, or who is in pursuit of his or her first baccalaureate 77 degree following a two-year stop-out period after receiving 78 his or her first associate degree and who did not previously 79 receive a grant award, who satisfies the criteria set out in 80 this chapter, and who is found to be eligible by rules adopted 81 by the commission.

82 (10) GRANT. A financial award by the State of Alabama
83 to defray the cost of tuition and mandatory fees to an
84 eligible adult learner who is currently enrolled in an



85 authorized institution.

86 (11) PROGRAM. The ReEngage Alabama Grant Program87 created by this chapter.

(12) YEAR. An academic year that shall be divided into
Fall, Winter, Spring, and Summer terms. The term does not mean
calendar or fiscal year.

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"§16-33D-6

92 (a) The program shall be used to provide grant award 93 payments for eligible adult learners up to the maximum award amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for universities and 94 95 one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for community colleges per academic semester for a full-time student. 96 97 Proportional awards shall be given for students taking six to 11 hours and students enrolled in less common academic terms, 98 99 such as guarters, Summer terms, and intersessions.

(b) Each grant shall be renewable for the number of 100 terms normally required by the institution for the course of 101 102 study in which the adult learner is enrolled as long as the 103 student is continuously enrolled until the student receives-an 104 his or her first associate degree or-a his or her first 105 baccalaureate degree or his or her first baccalaureate degree 106 following a two-year stop-out period after receiving his or 107 her first associate degree and did not previously receive a ReEngage grant award. The commission shall grant a renewal 108 109 upon verification that the student remains an eligible 110 student.

(c) Grant award payments shall be distributed directly to the approved institution on behalf of the student during



113 the applicable year.

(d) The requirements of this chapter are contingent upon available funding for the program.

(e) The commission shall determine the necessary procedures for awarding grant award payments if the number of eligible applicants and recipients exceeds available funding.

(f) Any funds appropriated to the program shall be nonreverting.

121 (g) A percentage of the grant program's appropriations 122 may be expended for the operation and maintenance of the 123 program.

(h) Each authorized institution that enrolls an adult 124 learner who is eligible for the tuition and mandatory fees 125 126 benefits provided by this program shall take necessary action 127 to ensure that the student is aware of all other benefits that he or she may be entitled to under any other federal and state 128 129 educational benefits, and any student grant or scholarship. In 130 order to receive the benefits provided by this program, the 131 student shall take the necessary steps to utilize all of the above benefits." 132

133 Section 2. This act shall become effective on October134 1, 2025.
