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4	SYNOPSIS:
5	This bill would establish the Hunger-Free Campus
6	Act.
7	This bill would require the Alabama Commission
8	on Higher Education to establish a process for a
9	qualified public institution of higher education to be
10	designated as a hunger-free campus.
11	This bill would provide application and
12	eligibility requirements for designation as a
13	hunger-free campus.
14	This bill would also provide for the award of
15	grants to a hunger-free campus to purchase equipment
16	and supplies for on-campus food pantries, subject to
17	the appropriation of funds by the Legislature.
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20	A BILL
21	TO BE ENTITLED
22	AN ACT
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25	To create the Hunger-Free Campus Act administered by
26	the Alabama Commission on Higher Education; to provide for the
27	designation of a qualified public institution of higher

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education as a hunger-free campus; to provide application,



- 29 eligibility, and renewal criteria; and to require the
- 30 commission to adopt necessary rules.
- 31 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
- 32 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as
- 33 the Hunger-Free Campus Act.
- 34 Section 2. For the purposes of this act, the following
- 35 terms have the following meanings:
- 36 (1) COMMISSION. The Alabama Commission on Higher
- 37 Education.
- 38 (2) PUBLIC INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION. A public
- 39 two-year or four-year institution of higher education which
- 40 provides vocational, technical, collegiate, professional, or
- any other form of education above the secondary school level.
- 42 (3) SNAP. The federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance
- 43 Program.
- Section 3. The commission, by rule, shall establish an
- 45 application process for qualified public institutions of
- 46 higher education to be designated as hunger-free campuses. The
- 47 process shall include the completion and submission to the
- 48 commission of an application form developed by the commission,
- 49 the review of each submitted application form by the
- 50 commission, and the award of the designation to each public
- institution of higher education that meets the eligibility
- requirements provided in Section 4.
- 53 Section 4. To be eligible for designation as a
- hunger-free campus, a public institution of higher education
- 55 shall do all of the following:
- 56 (1) Establish a hunger-free task force. A task force



- 57 shall meet at least three times per academic year, annually
- 58 establish at least two program goals, and develop action plans
- for each of those goals. The membership of a task force, at a
- 60 minimum, shall include all of the following:
- a. At least two students who are enrolled in and
- 62 attending the public institution of higher education.
- b. A representative from the office of student affairs
- of the public institution of higher education.
- c. A representative from the financial aid office of
- the public institution of higher education.
- d. Any additional members deemed appropriate by the
- 68 public institution of higher education.
- 69 (2) Designate a staff member to be responsible for
- 70 assisting students with receiving information on SNAP benefits
- 71 in the state.
- 72 (3) Either: (i) provide options for students to utilize
- 73 SNAP benefits on each campus; or (ii) provide students with
- 74 information on local establishments in the geographic area
- 75 surrounding each campus where students may use SNAP benefits.
- 76 (4) Hold or participate in at least one food insecurity
- awareness event per academic year.
- 78 (5) Provide: (i) at least one physical food pantry on
- 79 each campus; or (ii) information about community supported
- 80 food pantries in the area surrounding each campus.
- 81 (6) Either: (i) develop a student meal credit donation
- 82 program; or (ii) develop and implement a program to provide
- 83 free food vouchers including, but not limited to, grocery
- 84 store gift cards, to students.



- (7) Administer a student survey about food insecurity
 and other basic needs of students at least every two years.

 Each public institution of higher education may partner with a
 local community-based organization to coordinate survey
- Section 5. (a) Designation as a hunger-free campus 91 shall be valid for two years, and, upon application to the 92 commission, may be renewed for an additional two years.

- 93 (b) If the commission determines that a public 94 institution of higher education does not meet the requirements 95 to renew its designation, the commission shall do both of the 96 following:
- a. Provide written notice to the public institution of higher education that the public institution of higher education has not met the criteria in Section 4.
 - b. Provide the public institution of higher education within 45 days from the receipt of notice to correct or amend its renewal application. If the public institution of higher education does not submit a corrected or amended renewal application that indicates compliance with the renewal requirements, the designation as a hunger-free campus shall not be renewed.
- 107 (c) A public institution of higher education whose
 108 designation as a hunger-free campus is not renewed may not
 109 apply for the designation again until the following academic
 110 year.
- Section 6. Subject to the appropriation of funds by the
 Legislature, the commission shall accept grant requests from



113	any public institution of higher education designated as a
114	hunger-free campus and shall award grants to those designated
115	public institutions of higher education on a competitive
116	basis. The commission shall determine the amount of each
117	grant, prioritizing grants made to designated public
118	institutions of higher education with the highest percentages
119	of eligible Pell Grant recipient enrollment. The grants shall
120	be used for the purchase of equipment and supplies including,
121	but not limited to, refrigeration appliances and shelving for
122	the conversion or upgrade of existing facilities to house food
123	pantries.
124	Section 7. The commission shall adopt rules as
125	necessary to administer and implement the program. A
126	percentage of any appropriation made to the commission for the
127	program may be expended by the commission for the operation
128	and maintenance of the program. Any funds appropriated to the
129	program shall be non-reverting.
130	Section 8. Grant recipients shall submit an annual
131	report to the commission regarding hunger-free activities on
132	the campus during the prior year and describe how grant awards
133	were used. The commission shall provide an annual report to
134	the Chair of the House Ways and Means Education Committee and

the Chair of the Senate Finance and Taxation Education

Committee to account for the use of funds and the

137 effectiveness of the grant program.

Section 9. This act shall become effective on October 139 1, 2025.
