3 Relating to the Alabama Science, Technology,
4 Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Council; to create the
5 council within the Department of Workforce; to provide for the
6 membership of the council, including the executive committee
7 of the council and additional members appointed by the
8 Governor and Secretary of Workforce; to provide for meetings;
9 and to provide for the duties and functions of the council.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

11 Section 1. For the purposes of this act, the following
12 terms have the following meanings:

13 (1) COUNCIL or STEM COUNCIL. The Alabama Science,
14 Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Council
15 created by this act.

16 (2) DEPARTMENT. The Department of Workforce.

17 (3) EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The executive committee of the
18 council.

19 (4) STEM. Science, technology, engineering, and math.

20 (5) STEM CAREERS. Careers that utilize concepts from
21 the STEM fields including, but not limited to, engineering,
22 life science, accounting, astronomy, physics, chemistry, earth
23 science, math and computing, information science, artificial
24 intelligence, health and medicine, including physicians,
25 nurses, technicians, and social sciences, including political
26 science and economics.

27 (6) STEM EDUCATION. Education that entails more than
28 achieving competency in individual STEM subject areas and



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requires students to be able to integrate concepts from multiple disciplines and use that knowledge to solve complex problems. The term often includes instructional practices that actively engage all students in an interdisciplinary project or problem-based approach, tied to a real world, authentic challenge through which students use various technologies to assist their inquiry, research, and communication.

Section 2. (a) The Alabama Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Council is established as a state entity within the department to advise the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of Workforce, Executive Director of the Alabama Commission on Higher Education, Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System, State Superintendent of Education, Chair of the Alabama Workforce Board, and the Legislature on ways to improve STEM-related education, career awareness, and workforce development across the state.

(b) The Chief of the Workforce Pathways Division of the department shall be responsible for the administrative functions of the council and, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee of the STEM Council, shall hire an individual employed by the department to serve as the Director of the STEM Council. The director shall serve in that position at the pleasure of the Executive Committee of the STEM Council.

Section 3. (a) The membership of the STEM Council shall consist of all of the following:

(1) Two members appointed by the Governor with



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57 expertise in STEM education or workforce development.

58 (2) Two members appointed by the Secretary of Workforce
59 with expertise in workforce development.

60 (3) The following public officials or their designees:

61 a. The Chair of the Alabama Workforce Board.

62 b. The Secretary of Commerce.

63 c. The Secretary of Early Childhood Education.

64 d. The State Superintendent of Education.

65 e. The Chancellor of the Alabama Community College
66 System.

67 f. The Executive Director of the Alabama Commission on
68 Higher Education.

69 (4) One member appointed by the Governor from each of
70 the state's workforce regions.

71 (5) Additional members appointed by the Governor and
72 Secretary of Workforce as representatives of the state's STEM
73 stakeholders, including STEM industry representatives, formal
74 STEM education organizations, and informal STEM education
75 organizations.

76 (b) The appointing authorities shall coordinate their
77 appointments to assure the council membership is inclusive and
78 reflects the racial, gender, geographic, urban, rural, and
79 economic diversity of the state.

80 (c) STEM Council members shall serve until their
81 successors are appointed. A vacancy shall be filled in the
82 manner provide for the original appointment. An individual
83 appointed to fill a vacancy on the council shall serve only
84 for the remaining unexpired portion of the term.



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(d) Each council member shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority for a four-year renewable term.

(e) Members of the STEM Council shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable travel and other expenses actually incurred as an incident to their service on the council as approved by the Chair of the STEM Council. Expenses shall be paid using any funds appropriated for use by the council in the same manner as is provided by law for state officers and employees.

Section 4. The STEM Council shall have the following committees:

(1) The executive committee. The STEM Council shall be under the direction of an executive committee, consisting of the individuals identified in subdivisions (a)(1), (a)(2), and (a)(4) of Section 3, and shall be led by the Chair of the STEM Council, appointed by the Governor. The business of the council shall be conducted by the executive committee, which may launch initiatives, make final recommendations, approve budgets, evaluate the director, and take any other action in furtherance of the council's purpose and duties, consulting with the other members of the council and the Secretary of Workforce, as it deems appropriate.

(2) Additional committees. The chair of the council may form additional committees to address issues concerning the purpose and duties of the council. For each committee formed, the chair shall designate a serving member of the council as committee chair and shall provide for the membership and duties of the committee. Members appointed to additional



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committees may also be serving as members of the council.

Section 5. (a) Regular meetings of the council shall be held at least annually and from time to time at the call of the council chair. Committee meetings shall be held at the call of the committee chair. Members of the council may participate in a meeting of the council by means of telephone conference, video conference, or similar communications equipment by means of which all individuals participating in the meeting may hear each other at the same time.

Participation by electronic means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting for all purposes. The council shall establish procedures and other policies necessary to perform the business of the council, including the establishment of a quorum.

(b) All regular and special meetings of the council, including committee meetings, shall comply with the Open Meetings Act.

Section 6. The duties of the Director of the STEM Council, with guidance from the council and the Chief Workforce Officer, shall include all of the following:

(1) Revise, as needed, and oversee the implementation of the state STEM strategic plan, working in concert with the Alabama Workforce Board's State Strategic Plan.

(2) Serve as the primary point of contact for communicating with state and national STEM organizations.

(3) Coordinate communication efforts to increase STEM awareness, illustrate the value of STEM learning, and highlight STEM careers across the state.



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(4) Develop and implement the Governor's STEM "Seal of Approval," using an evidence-based rubric to recognize individual programs or periodic events that advance STEM principles and learning across the state.

(5) Develop, implement, and maintain a digital registry of evidence-based and effective STEM instructional and professional learning strategies including summer, after-school, and out-of-school programs, project-based lesson plans, inquiry driven modules, and professional learning opportunities.

(6) In collaboration with the Alabama Commission on the Evaluation of Services, conduct comprehensive, external evaluations, as needed or requested, of STEM-based curricula and educational initiatives that receive funding from the Education Trust Fund, beginning with the Alabama Math, Science, and Technology Initiative; Technology in Motion; Office of Math Improvement; and the Alabama Science in Motion programs. Assessment rubrics should incorporate criteria relevant to the goals and outcomes of each initiative including, but not limited to, the impact on learning, effectiveness of human capital and organizational performance, cost per participant, fidelity of implementation, equitable access, the potential for engendering interest and engagement in STEM activities, and other criteria.

(7) Develop continuous improvement plans for the Alabama Math, Science, and Technology Initiative; Technology in Motion; Office of Math Improvement; and the Alabama Science in Motion programs based on the data gathered from the

170 (8) In collaboration with the Alabama Commission on the
171 Evaluation of Services, conduct comprehensive evaluations, as
172 needed or requested, of state preservice preparation and
173 in-service programs for educators teaching STEM subjects,
174 including both traditional and alternate pathways.

175 (9) Expand opportunities for STEM career exploration
176 and discovery, especially among groups that are
177 under-represented in STEM professions.

178 (10) Collaborate with the Alabama Commission on Higher
179 Education, the State Board of Education, and the deans of
180 two-year and four-year institutions of higher education to
181 develop and enact an effective plan to encourage and support
182 an increase in the number of college students choosing a STEM
183 teaching career.

184 (11) In collaboration with the Alabama Commission on
185 the Evaluation of Services and the Office of Education and
186 Workforce Statistics, collect, aggregate, and analyze relevant
187 STEM data to track progress against the state STEM strategic
188 plan, including data from the Alabama Terminal on Linking and
189 Analyzing Statistics (ATLAS) on career pathways, state
190 agencies, including student STEM enrollment, learning, and
191 achievement data, STEM labor market information, and measures
192 of both STEM and STEM career awareness, attitudes, and
193 perceptions from learners across the education and workforce
194 continuum.

195 (12) Collaborate with business and industry in the
196 state to determine current and future STEM workforce needs.



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197 (13) Promote in-demand Alabama STEM careers, aligning
198 them with viable educational opportunities.

199 (14) Provide an annual report on progress toward
200 implementing the state STEM strategic plan, with
201 recommendations for improvement, to all of the following:

- 202 a. The Governor.
- 203 b. The Lieutenant Governor.
- 204 c. The Secretary of Workforce.
- 205 d. The State Workforce Board.
- 206 e. The Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- 207 f. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- 208 g. The Chairs of the Senate Finance and Taxation
209 Education and House Ways and Means Education Committees.
- 210 h. The State Superintendent of Education.
- 211 i. The Chancellor of the Alabama Community College
212 System.
- 213 j. The Executive Director of the Alabama Commission on
214 Higher Education.

215 (15) Perform other tasks as requested by the Governor,
216 the Secretary of Workforce, and the Legislature.

217 Section 7. (a) The council shall receive
218 administrative, legal, and clerical support from the Chief of
219 the Workforce Pathways Division of the department.

220 (b) The department may retain the services of outside
221 experts, using funds appropriated for use by the council, on
222 behalf of the council.

223 (c) Upon request of the council, state agencies and
224 other state-funded entities shall cooperate with the council



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225 and provide any requested information and data.

226 Section 8. The council may establish a foundation to
227 assist in the development and implementation of the programs
228 to promote STEM education, STEM workforce development, and
229 STEM careers. The foundation may solicit and receive
230 contributions from private organizations to accomplish
231 objectives provided in this act.

232 Section 9. This act shall become effective on October
233 1, 2025.
