6	manufacturers of electronic equipment and software to						
7	ensure consumers and independent repair providers may

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18	Relating to consumer protection; to provide						
19	requirements for manufacturers of electronic equipment and						
20	software to ensure consumers and independent repair providers						
21	may repair electronics; and to provide civil penalties for

23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:						
24	Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as						
25	the Right to Repair Act.						
26	Section 2. (a) The Legislature finds and declares the						
27	following:						
28	(1) Consumers and independent repair providers face						

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- significant barriers to repairing electronic devices and equipment, leading to increased costs and electronic waste.
- 31 (2) The inability to repair purchased products
 32 undermines consumer rights and stifles competition in the
 33 repair market.
- 34 (3) Enabling repairs benefits the environment by
 35 extending the lifespan of electronic products and reducing the
 36 volume of waste sent to landfills.
- 37 (b) The purpose of this act is to ensure that consumers 38 and independent repair providers have access to the necessary 39 resources to repair and maintain electronic products in a fair 40 and reasonable manner.
- Section 3. For the purposes of this act, the following terms have the following meanings:
- 43 (1) CONSUMER. Any person that purchases or leases 44 electronic equipment for personal, business, or other use.
- 45 (2) INDEPENDENT REPAIR PROVIDER. Any person not
 46 affiliated with a manufacturer that offers repair services for
 47 electronic equipment.
- 48 (3) MANUFACTURER. Any person that manufactures or distributes electronic equipment or software.
- 50 (4) REPAIR DOCUMENTATION. Instructions, diagrams, 51 schematics, software, or other information necessary to 52 diagnose, maintain, or repair electronic equipment.
- Section 4. (a) A manufacturer shall make repair
 documentation, software, and tools available to consumers and
 independent repair providers on fair and reasonable terms.
 - (b) A manufacturer shall not impose contractual or

- tools, or software, except as allowed under Section 6.
- Section 5. (a) A manufacturer shall ensure the
- availability of replacement parts for electronic equipment for
- a minimum of five years after the last production date of the
- 62 product.
- (b) Replacement parts shall be offered on fair and
- 64 reasonable terms without requiring consumers or independent
- 65 repair providers to purchase additional services.
- Section 6. (a) A manufacturer may seek exemptions for
- 67 specific categories of equipment where unrestricted access to
- 68 repair resources poses a demonstrable risk to public safety,
- 69 health, or privacy.
- 70 (b) Exemptions shall require justification supported by
- 71 evidence and shall be reviewed by the Attorney General.
- 72 Section 7. (a) Any manufacturer that violates this act
- 73 shall be subject to penalties, including a fine not exceeding
- ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per violation.
- 75 (b) Consumers and independent repair providers may
- 76 bring a civil action to enforce their rights under this act.
- 77 Section 8. Manufacturers shall not be held liable for
- 78 damages arising from repairs conducted by consumers or
- 79 independent repair providers; provided, the manufacturer has
- 80 complied with the provisions of this act.
- 81 Section 9. This act shall become effective on October
- 82 1, 2025.
