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4	SYNOPSIS:
5	The Alabama Resilience Council was established
6	by Executive Order No. 736 to provide a forum for
7	coordinating activities of state government and for
8	facilitating interactions between state government and
9	the private sector to proactively address harmful
10	impacts on Alabama communities and infrastructure
11	before they occur.
12	This bill would permanently establish the
13	Alabama Resilience Council as an appointed advisory
14	group within the executive branch of state government.
15	This bill would also provide for the rules,
16	duties, and procedures of the council.
17	This bill would also authorize appointment of,
18	and provide for the responsibilities of, a Chief
19	Resilience Officer.
20	This bill would also require a statewide
21	resilience plan and statewide comprehensive risk and
22	vulnerability assessment.
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25	A BILL
26	TO BE ENTITLED
27	AN ACT
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29	To create the Alabama Resilience Council as an
30	appointed advisory group within the executive branch of state
31	government, and to provide for the rules, duties, and
32	procedures of the council; to authorize appointment of, and
33	provide for the responsibilities of, a Chief Resilience
34	Officer; to require a statewide resilience plan and statewide
35	comprehensive risk and vulnerability assessment.
36	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
37	Section 1. The Legislature finds and declares the
38	following:
39	(a) The protection of human life and property is a
40	fundamental responsibility of the state government.
41	(b) Alabama is susceptible to various natural and
42	manmade disaster events, posing threats to the safety of its
43	citizens, integrity of its infrastructure, prospects for its
44	economic growth, and maintenance and protection of its unique
45	natural resources. These threats also pose significant fiscal
46	and operational risks to functions of the state and local
47	government.
48	(c) Resilience is the capacity of individuals,
49	communities, businesses, and systems to anticipate, prepare
50	for, adapt to, and rapidly recover from adverse events.
51	Resilience is guided by five principles: individual
52	responsibility; collective continuity and function; factual
53	assessment of risk; integrated resilience efforts; and focused
54	support.
55	(d) The Alabama Resilience Council established by

55 (d) The Alabama Resilience Council established by 56 Executive Order No. 736, May 5, 2023, has examined resilience

57 policy needs to address current and future adverse events, and 58 based on its findings, Alabama would benefit from a lasting, 59 comprehensive approach to resilience.

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(e) Coordinated statewide resilience efforts and development of a statewide resilience plan would be most effective under a single designated Chief Resilience Officer to coordinate activities of the Alabama Resilience Council.

Section 2. (a) Commencing upon the governor's revocation of Executive Order No. 736, the Alabama Resilience Council shall be created as an appointed advisory group within the executive branch of state government for the purpose of coordinating resilience-related activities of state government and for facilitating interactions between state government and the private sector to proactively address harmful impacts on Alabama communities and infrastructure before they occur.

- 72 (b) The voting members of the council shall consist of
 73 the Governor or his or her designee and the head of the
 74 following agencies or their designees:
- 75 (1) The Alabama Department of Agriculture and 76 Industries.
- 77 (2) The Alabama Department of Commerce.
- 78 (3) The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.
- 80 (4) The Alabama Department of Economic and Community 81 Affairs.
- 82 (5) The Alabama Department of Environmental Management.
- 83 (6) The Alabama Department of Finance.
- 84 (7) The Alabama Department of Insurance.

- 85 (8) The Alabama Department of Public Health.
- 86 (9) The Alabama Department of Transportation.
- 87 (10) The Alabama Emergency Management Agency.
- 88 (11) The Alabama Forestry Commission.
- 89 (12) The Alabama Geological Survey.
- 90 (13) The Alabama Military Department (i.e., the
- 91 National Guard).
- 92 (14) The Alabama Office of Information Technology.
- 93 (15) The Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency.
- 94 (16) Additional voting members as appointed by the
- 95 Governor.
- 96 (c) The non-voting members of council shall consist of
- 97 representatives from the following entities:
- 98 (1) The Alabama Soil and Water Conservation Committee.
- 99 (2) The Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- 100 (3) The National Weather Service.
- 101 (4) The United States Army Corps of Engineers.
- 102 (5) The United States Economic Development
- 103 Administration.
- 104 (6) The United States Forest Service.
- 105 (7) The United States Small Business Administration.
- 106 (8) Additional non-voting members as appointed by the
- 107 Governor.
- 108 (c) The council membership shall be inclusive and
- 109 reflect the racial, gender, geographic, urban, rural, and
- 110 economic diversity of the state.
- 111 Section 3. The duties of the Alabama Resilience Council
- 112 shall be as follows:

113	(a) Develop strategies to guide statewide resilience
114	efforts by prioritizing objectives reflecting pressing
115	resilience challenges. To this end, the council shall
116	regularly convene government and private-sector stakeholders
117	with different perspectives and interests to facilitate
118	planning across jurisdictions and sectors and thereby to avoid
119	cascading failures. The council shall develop principles to
120	guide the work of state government in carrying out its
121	resilience initiatives.

(b) Assist the Chief Resilience Officer in the development, maintenance, and implementation of the statewide resilience plan.

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- (c) Enhance community awareness to prepare for, and
 protect against, hazards; to enable greater understanding of
 personal risks; to educate residents of the state about how to
 mitigate risks; and to increase knowledge of resources
 available for mitigation efforts.
- (d) Solicit participation of the private sector in
 programs to collectively strengthen the resilience of
 businesses and communities. The council shall engage the
 private sector to reduce costs from lost productivity and
 pursue joint, public-private efforts to avoid infrastructure
 damages.
 - (e) Improve the public's ability to assess risk management alternatives by reducing the complexity of risk information for non-technical audiences, by generating and sharing reliable information that helps decisionmakers identify and select risk-reduction alternatives, and by

- providing guidance about assistance programs and funding
 opportunities based on needs, cost effectiveness, feasibility,
 potential resources, and returns on investment.
- 144 (f) Pursue and support federal and state policies and
 145 programs that promote innovative and flexible solutions for
 146 achieving individual, community, and statewide resilience. To
 147 this end, the council shall engage the support and assistance
 148 of government agencies, professional associations, businesses,
 149 private citizens, non-profit organizations, and interested
 150 parties.
- 151 (g) Provide support and assistance in the preparation
 152 and maintenance of the state hazard mitigation plan, as
 153 contemplated by the federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000,
 154 42 U.S.C. § 5121, et seq., or successor federal statute;
 155 provided that the Alabama Emergency Management Agency shall be
 156 responsible for administrative maintenance and day-to-day
 157 execution of the plan.
- 158 (h) Identify and pursue funding through federal, state,
 159 and private opportunities to promote resilience in the State
 160 of Alabama.
- Section 4. (a) The council shall be led by a Chair,

 Vice-Chair, Co-Chairs, or other leadership positions from

 within the membership on the council. Leadership positions

 shall be appointed by the Governor and shall serve at the

 pleasure of the Governor.
- 166 (b) The council shall develop, adopt, and maintain 167 bylaws governing its activities; provided the bylaws are

- 168 consistent with the provisions of this Act. At its discretion,
 169 the council may establish working groups or subcommittees.
- 170 (c) The council shall meet at least twice each year and
- 171 may meet more frequently upon the call of the chair, subject
- to the Open Meetings Act. Members of the council may
- 173 participate in a meeting of the council by means of telephone
- 174 conference, video conference, or similar communications
- 175 equipment by means of which all individuals participating in
- 176 the meeting may hear each other at the same time.
- 177 Participation by electronic means shall constitute presence in
- 178 person at a meeting for all purposes.
- 179 (d) Members of the council shall serve without
- 180 compensation except members who are public officials or public
- 181 employees may elect to receive the per diem and travel
- 182 allowance authorized by state law for persons traveling on
- 183 official state business.
- 184 (e) Administrative support shall be provided by the
- 185 council's appointed leadership and the Chief Resilience
- 186 Officer.
- 187 Section 5. (a) The Governor may appoint a Chief
- 188 Resilience Officer to coordinate the activities of the council
- 189 established pursuant to Section 2 and lead the development,
- 190 maintenance, and implementation of the Resilience Plan. The
- 191 Chief Resilience Officer shall serve at the pleasure of the
- 192 governor.
- 193 (b) The duties of the Chief Resilience Officer shall be
- 194 as follows:

195	(1)	Conduct	a	comprehensive	inventory	of	Alabama's
196	resilience	assets.					

- 197 (2) Identify areas of collaboration among state
 198 agencies, areas of overlap, and potential shareable resources.
- 199 (3) Review resilience programs from both inside Alabama 200 and among comparable states.
- 201 (4) Engage state agencies to examine how to best
 202 collect, organize, analyze, and communicate data in ways that
 203 advance Alabama's resilience principles.
- 204 (5) Identify and enhance state agency knowledge of 205 statewide resilience efforts.
- 206 (6) Identify and pursue funding through federal, state, 207 and private opportunities to promote resilience in the State 208 of Alabama.
- Section 6. (a) The Chief Resilience Officer shall
 develop, maintain, and implement a statewide resilience plan,
 with the general oversight and leadership of the council. The
 plan shall include the following components:
- 213 (1) Statewide Comprehensive Risk and Vulnerability
 214 Assessment. The plan will evaluate the impacts of extreme
 215 weather and disasters. It will assess current and future risks
 216 across various hazards using historical data and future
 217 scenarios while factoring in land and water management
 218 practices. The assessment will examine effects on communities,
 219 infrastructure, the economy, and the environment.
- Additionally, a vulnerability assessment will identify the social, economic, and environmental systems most at risk. It will analyze risk exposure, potential costs, and impacts on

state assets, government functions, local economies, and critical natural systems.

- 225 (2) Resilience Actions. The plan will provide a prioritized list of resilience actions to address 226 227 vulnerabilities, detailing their benefits, costs, and 228 implementation timeline. Priority shall be given to actions 229 that effectively mitigate the impacts of future disasters, 230 particularly those that provide multiple co-benefits, such as enhancing environmental stewardship, economic stability, or 231 public health. Resilience actions that incorporate or restore 232 233 natural features to achieve risk mitigation benefits shall also be prioritized, provided they are cost-effective and 234 235 demonstrate long-term advantages over alternative approaches. 236 The plan will also outline how these actions align with existing efforts by state agencies, local governments, and 237 238 other entities, ensuring they complement the state hazard 239 mitigation plan.
 - (3) Implementation Strategy. The plan will include an implementation strategy outlining how resilience actions will be enacted, funded, and tracked. It will define roles, responsibilities, timelines, and metrics while prioritizing actions for high-risk vulnerabilities. The strategy will also support partnerships, provide technical assistance, and ensure public access to data for planning and decision-making.

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247 (b) The initial plan shall be completed within two
248 years of the Governor appointing a Chief Resilience Officer
249 and shall be reviewed and updated at least every two years

- 250 thereafter to ensure its continued effectiveness and
- 251 relevance.
- Section 7. This act shall become effective on October
- 253 1, 2025.
