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4	HJR EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE SOUTHERN REGIONAL
5	EDUCATION BOARD CRISIS RECOVERY SUPPORT NETWORK.
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7	WHEREAS, after natural disasters like hurricanes,
8	tornadoes and floods, after school shootings, and in public
9	emergencies, recovery must be prioritized as a long-term
10	process, rather than an immediate response only; and
11	WHEREAS, states, districts, and postsecondary
12	institutions have focused on crisis prevention and
13	management but may not have the capacity to provide
14	sustained support for their students, teachers, communities,
15	and even their own counselors during the recovery stage; and
16	WHEREAS, rural districts and institutions in
17	particular tend to have fewer counselors and limited access
18	to additional counseling resources; and
19	WHEREAS, school counselors are often expected to
20	respond to student needs after tragedy, even as they
21	themselves grapple with the emotional toll, underscoring the
22	need for external support for the entire school community;
23	and
24	WHEREAS, schools and institutions affected by crisis
25	may require at least a year of dedicated support to fully
26	recover; and
27	WHEREAS, recovery efforts can strain resources that
28	are already stretched thin, given that a National Center for

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29	Education Statistics study snowed that less than half of
30	public schools surveyed believe that their school is able to
31	provide mental health services to all students in need; and
32	WHEREAS, recovery is an extended healing process for
33	students and adults alike, and having additional counselors
3 4	come to the aid of a school or institution in extreme need
35	supports the healing process of all people in the community,
36	including teachers and counselors at that school; and
37	WHEREAS, specialized training for counselors is
38	essential to ensure that they have psychological first aid
39	training and provide counseling that aligns with the unique
10	needs of an educational environment; and
11	WHEREAS, research shows that students who receive
12	adequate support after a crisis are more likely to succeed
13	academically, remain in school, and contribute positively to
14	society; and
15	WHEREAS, the Southern Regional Education Board
16	(SREB), with its 75-year history of partnering with states
17	to improve education, is uniquely equipped to lead this
18	effort because of its ability to mobilize key education and
19	policymaking stakeholders at all levels; now therefore,
50	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
51	HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That to meet the urgent need for
52	a coordinated, region-wide effort to provide consistent
53	long-term counseling capacity that is ready to deploy
54	immediately after a crisis is managed, the Legislature
55	supports the SREB Crisis Recovery Support Network; the
56	Southern Regional Education Board, in close collaboration



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57	with governors' offices, state education agencies, local
58	districts, and postsecondary institutions, will complement
59	existing school and district crisis management efforts by
60	focusing on long-term healing and psychological resilience
61	by deploying counselors with specialized training to schools
62	in extreme need; and will hire a coordinator for the network
63	and cover travel costs for counselors during training and
64	deployment.
