6	WHEREAS, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, is
7	the first intercollegiate historically African American
8	sorority; it was founded on January 15, 1908, at Howard
9	University in Washington, D.C., by a group of 16 students
10	led by Ethel Hedgemon Lyle; the sorority was incorporated or
11	January 29, 1913; and
12	WHEREAS, the sorority is one of the nation's largest
13	Greek Letter Organizations, having more than 350,000 members
14	in 1,024 chapters in the United States of America and
15	several other countries; the members share the bonds of
16	sisterhood and are committed to servant-leadership; and
17	WHEREAS, the Omicron Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa
18	Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, received its charter on
19	October 24, 1924, in Birmingham, Alabama, becoming the 15th
20	chapter of the sorority and the first graduate chapter to be
21	chartered in the Southeastern Region; the eight charter
22	members, Hilda Evans, Vivian F. Bell, Jessie Coleman, Wilma
23	Davis, Mabel Harris, Eunice Hudson, Thelma Kingsley, and
24	Vernona Pierce, became the first African American members of
25	a sorority in the State of Alabama; and
26	WHEREAS, the chapter's membership has included
27	thousands of professional women who are dedicated public

28 servants and graduates from universities throughout the

- 29 United States; today, the chapter membership stands at 385,
- 30 the largest in the chapter's history; and
- 31 WHEREAS, in the early 1950s, under the leadership of
- 32 A. Lucile Brewer, the Omicron Omega Chapter experienced
- 33 another milestone by becoming the first Black Greek Letter
- 34 Organization to purchase a chapter house in the State of
- 35 Alabama; additionally, in this same timeframe, they were
- 36 instrumental in establishing the Birmingham Chapter of the
- 37 Panhellenic Council; and
- 38 WHEREAS, over the course of the last century, the
- 39 Omicron Omega Chapter has had a profound philanthropic
- 40 impact on the greater Birmingham community, having donated
- 41 over \$1.5 million in charitable contributions to
- 42 organizations such as the United Negro College Fund,
- 43 National Association for the Advancement of Colored People,
- 44 Miles College, The Sickle Cell Foundation of Central
- 45 Alabama, March of Dimes, Dance Across Birmingham, and the
- 46 American Heart Association; and
- WHEREAS, additionally, the Omicron Omega Chapter has
- invested time and financial support to Birmingham children
- 49 and their education; the members have spent thousands of
- 50 hours volunteering in local schools, and the Chapter has
- 51 distributed over \$500,000 in college scholarships to
- 52 Birmingham-area students; and
- 53 WHEREAS, the Omicron Omega Chapter has overseen the
- 54 establishment of five undergraduate chapters on college
- campuses in the greater Birmingham area: Gamma Pi at Miles
- 56 College in 1970; Iota Phi at The University of Alabama at

58	1978; Nu Delta at Birmingham-Southern College in 1979; and
59	Omicron Mu at Samford University in 1988; and
60	WHEREAS, in 2001, the Omicron Omega Chapter
61	established its philanthropic arm, the Cultural and
62	Educational Advancement Foundation (CEAF), to further its
63	philanthropic impact on the Birmingham community; in 2022,
64	CEAF opened The Pearl Center, a \$1.6 million facility in the
65	Bush Hills neighborhood designed as a space to facilitate
66	charitable endeavors for the larger Birmingham community;
