4	HR RECOGNIZING RIVA HIRSCH AS A HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR.

6	WHEREAS, Riva Hirsch, born Riva Schuster, was only
7	seven years old in 1941 when her childhood was violently
8	interrupted by the Nazi occupation of her hometown of
9	Novaseletz, Romania, now modern-day Ukraine, during the
10	Holocaust, a tragedy that would take the lives of over six
11	million Jews and millions of other innocent people; and
12	WHEREAS, after receiving a warning from a family
13	friend, young Riva and her family attempted to flee to
14	safety but were instead captured and transported in
15	overcrowded cattle cars to a Nazi labor camp in Moghilev;
16	and
17	WHEREAS, she endured unimaginable horrors, witnessing
18	death and brutality, suffering from starvation, disease, and
19	the loss of her health, her home, and nearly her life; and
20	WHEREAS, separated from her family and later
21	transported to the Luchinetz labor camp, Riva survived
22	typhus, malaria, lice infestation, and extreme
23	malnourishment; and
24	WHEREAS, during one of many near-death experiences,
25	she was rescued by partisans, hidden in a wagon of hay, and
26	taken to a Catholic convent in Tul'chin where she lived in
27	isolation for two years in a six-foot-square bunker, with

rats and mice as her only companions, surviving only on

29	bread and pork provided every lew days; and
30	WHEREAS, Riva Schuster was liberated in 1945, carried
31	to the roadside by nuns, and rescued by survivors who
32	brought her to Chernovitz, where she was amazingly reunited
33	with her father and, in time, her mother and two brothers;
34	and
35	WHEREAS, in her journey to rebuild her life, she
36	boarded a boat to Palestine in 1946, was detained by British
37	forces and spent two years in a refugee camp in Cyprus
38	before reaching Israel in 1948, where she was finally
39	reunited with her family and began the next chapter of her
40	life; and
41	WHEREAS, Mrs. Hirsch met and married her husband,
42	Aisic Hirsch, also a Holocaust survivor, in Israel in 1950;
43	they were blessed with two children, Harold and Sheryl, and
44	later moved to New York in 1962 to provide the education and
45	opportunities they had been denied; and
46	WHEREAS, in 1992, Mrs. Hirsch and her family
47	relocated to Birmingham, Alabama, where they built a home
48	and legacy rooted in resilience, remembrance, and hope; and
49	WHEREAS, throughout her life, Riva Hirsch has
50	remained a tireless advocate for Holocaust education and
51	remembrance, sharing her testimony with younger generations
52	to ensure that the horrors of the Holocaust are never
53	forgotten, and to urge the world to pursue peace, education,
54	and justice; and
55	WHEREAS, Mrs. Hirsch, now 91 years old, stands as a
56	living testament to the strength of the human spirit, the

57	enduring will to survive, and the sacred responsibility of
58	ensuring the past is never forgotten; now therefore,
