5	HERMAN.

7	WHEREAS, it is with profound sorrow that we note the
8	death of dedicated public servant and Mobile, Alabama
9	native, Alexis Herman, at the age of 77; and
10	WHEREAS, born in 1947 in segregated Mobile, Alexis
11	Herman witnessed racial violence as a child and credited her
12	parents for teaching her to face adversity and to stand by
13	her principles; as a child, her father sued to integrate the
14	Democratic Party in Alabama, becoming the first Black ward
15	leader in the state; she came of age with a generation of
16	Black people who went on to break through color barriers and
17	become "the first African American" in their respective
18	fields; and
19	WHEREAS, Alexis Herman was a 1968 graduate of Xavier
20	University in New Orleans and earned a reputation as an
21	expert in the field of multiculturalism and diversity
22	management involving mergers and acquisitions; after
23	graduation, she returned to Mobile to work to desegregate
24	parochial schools; she founded her own consulting firm to
25	advance diversity in corporate America, working with Proctor
26	& Gamble, AT&T, and other major corporations; and
27	WHEREAS, she began her government service in 1977

under then-President Jimmy Carter and became the youngest

29	person to serve as the Director of the Women's Bureau at 29
30	years of age; throughout the 1980s, she worked on political
31	campaigns for prominent Black politicians, including
32	Reverend Jesse Jackson; she became the first Black woman to
33	hold the position of Chief Executive Officer of the
34	Democratic National Convention in 1992; also in 1992, at age
35	45, she was appointed one of two Deputy Directors of
36	President-elect Bill Clinton's transition team, who
37	appointed her to his cabinet as the United States Secretary
38	of Labor, the first African American to serve in that role;
39	within months of taking that role, she mediated the
40	negotiations between United Parcel Service leaders and
41	185,000 striking postal workers, ending the largest U.S.
42	strike in a decade; as a fierce advocate for workplace
43	equality, she promoted initiatives that brought U.S.
44	employment to a three-decade low, oversaw two raises to the
45	minimum wage, and helped pass the Workforce Investment Act
46	of 1998, which expanded workforce training for low-income
47	Americans across the country; and
48	WHEREAS, Alexis Herman broke many barriers in her
49	prolific career and empowered others to do the same; she was
50	a leader in business, government, and her community,
51	dedicating her life to strengthening America's workforce and
52	creating better lives for hardworking families; she was
53	predeceased by her husband, Dr. Charles Franklin; now
54	therefore,
