8	WHEREAS, the Reverend Shandy Jones was born in
9	Huntsville, Alabama, in 1816 to an enslaved mother and a
10	member of the slave master's family; and
11	WHEREAS, before his 21st birthday, Shandy Jones was
12	emancipated and moved from Huntsville to Tuscaloosa,
13	Alabama; in 1837, he married Elvina Love, who was also the
14	offspring of an enslaved woman and her slave owner and was
15	later freed; and
16	WHEREAS, Shandy Jones apprenticed as a barber and
17	later opened his own barbershop, achieving financial
18	security and successfully raising a family of 14 children;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, for the next decade, he built a thriving
21	barbering business serving Tuscaloosa's white community,
22	allowing him to learn business practices and strategies
23	through his interactions; as a result, by 1860, Shandy Jones
24	had accumulated real estate holdings worth \$7,000, a
25	significant achievement for a Black man in Alabama at that
26	time; he was one of the most successful Black men in
27	Tuscaloosa and among the wealthiest in Alabama; and

29	was ordained as a minister in the Airican Methodist
30	Episcopal Zion Church and played a pivotal role in
31	establishing Tuscaloosa's first Black school and church,
32	Hunter's Chapel AME Zion Church; and
33	WHEREAS, before the Civil War, he became involved
3 4	with the American Colonization Society, which sought to
35	assist free Black Americans in emigrating to Liberia; Mr.
36	Jones wrote letters to the African Repository, the society's
37	official publication, advocating for the freedom of all
38	people of color in the United States and expressing his
39	support for Black colonization in Liberia; and
40	WHEREAS, after the Civil War, during the
41	Reconstruction era, Shandy Jones became active in the
42	Republican Party; following the ratification of the
43	Fourteenth Amendment, he ran for office and won a seat in
4 4	the Alabama House of Representatives, becoming one of the
45	first Black legislators in Alabama; he served until 1870,
46	when he lost his bid for re-election; and
47	WHEREAS, as white resistance to Reconstruction
48	intensified in Tuscaloosa, many groups targeted Shandy
49	Jones; his businesses, including his barbershop, faced
50	organized boycotts; due to these hostilities, Mr. Jones and
51	his family relocated to Mobile in 1871, leaving behind
52	everything he had worked to build; and
53	WHEREAS, upon arriving in Mobile, Shandy Jones was
54	appointed to a position at the U.S. Customs House by
55	President Ulysses S. Grant in recognition of his political
56	contributions to the Republican Party in 1872; and

57	WHEREAS, Shandy Jones became the pastor of Little
58	Zion AME Zion Church in Mobile, in 1880, later renamed Big
59	Zion AME, serving faithfully until his death in 1886; and
60	WHEREAS, Shandy Jones was laid to rest in Magnolia
61	Cemetery, where his grave remained unmarked until 2015, when
62	the Friends of Magnolia Cemetery successfully located his
63	burial site and placed a prominent grave marker in his
64	honor; and
65	WHEREAS, Big Zion AME Zion Church Heritage Day will
66	be held on February 9, 2025; on this special day, the church
67	will pay homage to the Honorable Reverend Shandy Jones; now
68	therefore,
69	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
70	LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That the Alabama House of
71	Representatives joins Big Zion AME Zion Church in
72	recognizing Reverend Shandy Jones as a significant figure in
73	Alabama's history who overcame immense challenges of his
74	time to emerge as a successful businessman, religious
75	leader, and politician; his contributions to the Black
76	community and his advocacy for freedom and equality remain a
77	lasting legacy.
