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SYNOPSIS:

This bill makes appropriations for the support, maintenance and development of public education in Alabama, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026.

A BILL  
TO BE ENTITLED  
AN ACT

To make appropriations for the support, maintenance and development of public education in Alabama, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, for debt service, and for capital outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act and the amounts specified in subsections (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds

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28 other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this  
29 act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the  
30 Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean  
31 all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including  
32 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or  
33 counties.

34 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in this  
35 act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the  
36 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers'  
37 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund,  
38 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education  
39 Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds  
40 and are hereby made for the support of public education in  
41 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and the  
42 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions,  
43 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial  
44 Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.),  
45 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of  
46 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the  
47 amounts hereinafter specified.

48 (b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Other Funds"  
49 and "Total" are as set forth for the purpose of establishing  
50 amounts estimated to be available by programmatic area from  
51 sources other than those listed in subsection (a) of this  
52 Section 2, in order, upon consideration of such other funds so  
53 estimated to be available, to promote the accountability for  
54 an efficient use of funds available, and the same are hereby

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55 appropriated by the Legislature. Provided, however, that  
56 regardless of the ending date of any pay period which has been  
57 or may be established by the Legislature for the payment of  
58 salaries of state employees, the entire payment due shall be  
59 made from the fiscal year's appropriation in which the pay  
60 date falls.

61 (c) All appropriations made in Section 3 shall be at  
62 the program level. Any directed expenditure of funds below a  
63 program shall be from funds appropriated for the program.

Such costs include, but are not limited to: (i) AIDT operating costs directly related to a Project; (ii) wages and benefits for trainers engaged by AIDT for the purpose of a Project; (iii) costs which the State has agreed to pay under the terms of a Project Agreement with a company that are necessary and reasonable charges incurred by the company or its affiliates for personnel providing training to the company's employees, whether those trainers are employees of the company or its vendors or suppliers, including wages, benefits and travel (domestic and, when necessary, international); (iv) any necessary materials, equipment, manuals, or other relevant training materials; (v) the costs incurred for purchasing or repairing or replacing training tools and equipment; (vi) costs incurred for the purchase or construction and maintenance of training facilities; (vii) travel expenses for prospective and current employees and trainees, including travel, food, lodging, relocation, and other costs necessary and reasonable to enable the company to secure a qualified workforce; and (viii) outside training fees. The above funds appropriated for Workforce Development shall be expended primarily for the training of Alabama residents. It is further the intent that contracts with vendors to provide workforce training shall be inclusive and reflect the racial and gender diversity of the State. The Secretary of the Department of Commerce shall report semi-annually to the Chairs of the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Finance Director, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer any funds allocated for workforce training. Such report shall include a summary of the persons trained and the vendors providing the training. The report shall contain information including the residence, race and gender of the persons trained and of the principal or majority owner of the firm or business contracted with to provide the training services.</p>

2485           Section 4. Any state agency, local board of education,  
2486 or public institution of higher education receiving funding  
2487 from the Education Trust Fund in this appropriations act shall  
2488 be in compliance with the provisions of Act 2024-34 of the  
2489 2024 Regular Session of the Legislature.

2490           Section 5. In addition to the appropriations herein  
2491 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or  
2492 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act,  
2493 including grants by the Congress of the United States,  
2494 municipalities or counties, to any department, division,  
2495 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or  
2496 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and,  
2497 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to  
2498 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency,  
2499 institution, office, or officer to be used only for the  
2500 purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or  
2501 shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal, and  
2502 educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as  
2503 deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and  
2504 the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public  
2505 Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services  
2506 performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby  
2507 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department

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2508 of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be  
2509 expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22,  
2510 Code of Alabama 1975.

2511 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education shall  
2512 make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the  
2513 proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules and  
2514 regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of any  
2515 and all funds appropriated to the State Department of  
2516 Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act,  
2517 whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor.  
2518 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after  
2519 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the  
2520 manner now provided by law.

2521 Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to  
2522 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any  
2523 college, school, or other education or eleemosynary  
2524 institution of the State to receive, collect or disburse any  
2525 fees, tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income  
2526 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to  
2527 receive, collect, or disburse. The receiving college, school  
2528 or institution shall further maintain separate accounts for  
2529 such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which  
2530 will show a cash flow of such receipts received under the  
2531 provision of this appropriation.

2532 Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the  
2533 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies  
2534 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards,

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2535 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make  
2536 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the  
2537 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the  
2538 fiscal year ending September 30, 2026. All agencies and  
2539 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from  
2540 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the  
2541 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely  
2542 manner for such services.

2543           Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous  
2544 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized  
2545 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no  
2546 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately  
2547 following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made  
2548 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or  
2549 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations  
2550 were made.

2551           Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of  
2552 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has  
2553 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or  
2554 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby  
2555 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or  
2556 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court  
2557 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other  
2558 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this  
2559 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon  
2560 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director  
2561 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available

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2562 for court-ordered payments.

2563           Section 11. Local boards of education may exercise  
2564 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a  
2565 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of  
2566 education support personnel.

2567           Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education may  
2568 approve a request by a local board of education for  
2569 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for  
2570 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition  
2571 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child  
2572 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from  
2573 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

2574           Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the  
2575 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies  
2576 include the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees'  
2577 Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$1,025 per  
2578 month for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending  
2579 September 30, 2026. The State Employees' Insurance Board will  
2580 adjust the insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain  
2581 the aforementioned fixed rate.

2582           Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of  
2583 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for  
2584 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025 to the various state  
2585 agencies and institutions in this act, including  
2586 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are  
2587 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2025 are hereby  
2588 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices, and

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2589 institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2025.

2590           Section 15. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes  
2591 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall  
2592 be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the  
2593 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in  
2594 the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities  
2595 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students.  
2596 At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met  
2597 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and  
2598 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a  
2599 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies  
2600 for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an  
2601 English language learner. In the awarding of grants,  
2602 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly  
2603 impact student achievement and improve performance on state  
2604 assessments to include remediation for students, after-school  
2605 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character  
2606 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance  
2607 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that  
2608 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college  
2609 readiness, and early warning and prevention programs. Programs  
2610 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student  
2611 growth and achievement using research-based norms and  
2612 criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with  
2613 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward  
2614 personnel costs.

2615           (b) In an effort to provide the best and most



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2616 efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in  
2617 schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned  
2618 to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of  
2619 Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input  
2620 from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory  
2621 personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as  
2622 appropriate. The grant application process must require  
2623 districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of  
2624 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with  
2625 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be  
2626 awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the  
2627 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama  
2628 State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and  
2629 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify  
2630 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2025. No funding will  
2631 be available until October 1, 2025. Grantees will have no  
2632 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2025.

2633 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the Alabama  
2634 State Department of Education must submit a report to the  
2635 Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the  
2636 Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, the  
2637 Finance Director, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer that  
2638 shall indicate the grant-recipient districts and each  
2639 district's plan for those funds. Those districts shall submit  
2640 follow-up reports indicating the results of those plans from  
2641 the previous school year by July 31, 2026.

2642 Section 16. (a) All nongovernmental entities,

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2643 identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are  
2644 allocated funds in Section 3 of this act shall file a report  
2645 with the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education  
2646 Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and  
2647 Taxation-Education, Finance Director, and the Legislative  
2648 Fiscal Officer prior to the start of the 2026 Regular Session,  
2649 regarding the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds  
2650 appropriated in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026. The  
2651 Legislative Services Agency shall provide notice to the  
2652 identified nongovernmental entities within 60 days following  
2653 enactment of this act regarding the reporting requirements and  
2654 the methodology to submit reports and format to be used, which  
2655 may include an online platform.

2656 (b) In the event an entity was appropriated funds from  
2657 the Education Trust Fund in the fiscal year ending September  
2658 30, 2025, the entity shall also include in its report a  
2659 detailed breakdown of the expenditure and use of those funds,  
2660 including an inventory of the services delivered and number of  
2661 clients served, pursuant to guidelines established by the  
2662 Legislative Services Agency.

2663 Section 17. The State Superintendent of Education  
2664 shall notify each local superintendent and finance officer of  
2665 each local education agency by email regarding the  
2666 availability and application process, including any required  
2667 forms, for any available grant opportunities during FY 2026.  
2668 The State Superintendent shall notify all members of the local  
2669 legislative delegation five days prior to the announcement of

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2670 any grant made to any entity located in the legislative  
2671 jurisdiction. The five days prior notice requirement shall be  
2672 waived in the event of a declared emergency. The Governor  
2673 shall encourage the Department to disburse the funds provided  
2674 herein on a nondiscriminatory basis.

2675           Section 18. If any section, paragraph, sentence,  
2676 clause, provision, or portion of this act or all or any  
2677 portion of the appropriations herein made is held  
2678 unconstitutional or invalid, it shall not affect any other  
2679 section, paragraph, sentence, clause, provision, or portion of  
2680 this act or any other appropriation or appropriations or  
2681 portion thereof hereby made not in and of itself  
2682 unconstitutional or invalid.

2683           Section 19. All laws or parts of laws, general,  
2684 special, private, or local in conflict with or inconsistent  
2685 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

2686           Section 20. This act shall become effective on October  
2687 1, 2025.
