A BILL

TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

To make supplemental appropriations from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025, to the public institutions of higher education in the amount of \$342,125,000, and to the Department of Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts, the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and Science, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Cyber Technology and Engineering, and the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Healthcare Sciences in the amount of \$807,866,080, to the Department of Education in the amount of \$100,000,000, and to reappropriate unexpended and reverted funds from the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024 in the amount of \$35,057,322.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a total of \$342,125,000 from the Education Trust Fund



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Advancement and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025. This appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975. This appropriation shall be distributed as follows:

Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a total of \$807,866,080 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department of Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts,



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the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and Science, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Cyber Technology and Engineering, and the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Healthcare Sciences, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025. This appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 3. (a) The Department of Education shall allocate the funds appropriated herein to the local boards of education and entities as follows:

292 (b) Notwithstanding any other laws to the contrary, the
293 funds appropriated to the Department of Education by
294 subsection (a) of this section shall not be expended without
295 prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education.

296 (c) (1) The above appropriation for teacher professional
297 development shall be allocated to the Alabama Department of
298 Education to be distributed to the Ed Farm Classroom of
299 Tomorrow. These funds will be used by Ed Farm to provide
300 technology tools and professional development services to
301 classroom teachers in an effort to improve instruction and
302 student learning gains. It is the intent of the legislature
303 that in addition to general programmatic costs, Ed Farm may
304 also expend funds for software, hardware, administrative
305 costs, and professional learning services.

306 (2) The State Superintendent shall provide a report of
307 the initiative to the Chair of the House Ways and
308 Means-Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate
309 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education no later than
310 October 1, 2026.



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311 Section 4. (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of
312 Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975, and in addition to all
313 other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is
314 hereby appropriated a total of \$100,000,000 from the Education
315 Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department
316 of Education to provide matching grants to local education
317 agencies for expenses related to developing regional career
318 technology centers throughout the state, including capital
319 outlay and equipment. Grant proposals shall be submitted by a
320 collaboration of at least two local education agencies. The
321 State Superintendent of Education shall utilize a sliding
322 scale of matching requirements for grant proposals, taking
323 into consideration the financial capacity of the eligible
324 local education agencies to provide matching funds, so long as
325 the required match does not exceed 50 percent of the total
326 cost of the project.

327 (b) The State Superintendent of Education shall notify
328 each local superintendent and finance officer of each local
329 education agency by email regarding the availability and
330 application process of grants to be awarded pursuant to this
331 section, including any required forms. The State
332 Superintendent shall notify all members of the local
333 legislative delegation five days prior to the announcement of
334 any grant made to any entity located in the legislative



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jurisdiction. The five days prior notice requirement shall be waived in the event of a declared emergency. The Governor shall encourage the Department to disburse the funds provided herein on a nondiscriminatory basis.

Section 5. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act or any other act, in addition to the above appropriations, \$35,057,322 of Advancement and Technology Fund appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024 to the State Department of Education which were unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2024 are hereby reappropriated to the following local boards of education in the following amounts:

Section 6. All funds appropriated herein and not expended in the current fiscal year shall not revert but be carried forward for the purpose appropriated.

Section 7. This act shall become effective immediately.
