11	Relating to public K-12 education; to establish the
12	Freeing our Classrooms of Unnecessary Screens for Safety
13	(FOCUS) Act; to prohibit the use, operation, and possession of
14	wireless communication devices on certain public school
15	properties; to require local boards of education to adopt an
16	Internet safety policy; to add Section 16-40-13 to the Code of
17	Alabama 1975, to require students to complete a social media
18	safety course prior to entering the eighth grade; and to
19	repeal Section 16-1-27, Code of Alabama 1975, providing for
20	the use of electronic communication devices on school
21	property.
22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. The Legislature finds and declares the
24	following:
25	(1) Each student in an Alabama public K-12 school should
26	be college-ready or career-ready upon high school graduation.



- 27 (2) Many high school teachers believe that cell phones 28 and other electronic communication devices are distracting 29 students in the classroom.
- 30 (3) Studies have shown that cell phones and other
 31 electronic communication devices are negatively impacting
 32 learning outcomes.
- 33 (4) Studies have shown that increased social media usage 34 may negatively affect the mental health of school-aged 35 children.
- 36 Section 2. For the purposes of this act, the following 37 terms have the following meanings:
- 38 (1) INSTRUCTIONAL DAY. The period of time during which a
 39 public elementary or secondary school is open and in session
 40 for purpose of meeting the minimum number of instructional
 41 days or hours pursuant to Section 16-13-231, Code of Alabama
 42 1975. The term also includes class transitions, lunch,
 43 non-instructional times, and any other time specified in a
 44 wireless communication device policy.

- (2) WIRELESS COMMUNICATION DEVICE. A cellular telephone, tablet computer, laptop computer, pager, gaming device, or any other portable electronic device identified in a wireless communication device policy that has the capability of exchanging voice, messaging, or other data communication with another electronic device.
- (3) WIRELESS COMMUNICATION DEVICE POLICY. A written
 policy adopted by a local board of education to implement this
 act.



54 Section 3. (a) Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, no student shall use or operate any wireless communication 55 56 device in any public elementary or secondary school building 57 or on the grounds thereof during the instructional day.

- (b) Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, no student may possess a wireless communication device in any public elementary or secondary school building or on the grounds thereof during the instructional day unless the wireless communication device is turned off and stored off their person in a locker, car, or similar storage location.
- (c) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b), a student may use, operate, or possess a wireless communication device in a public elementary or secondary school building or on the grounds thereof during the instructional day in any of the following circumstances:
- (1) The use, operation, or possession is pursuant to the student's Individualized Education Program, Individualized Accommodation Plan, Section 504 plan, or Individualized Health Plan. 72
- 73 (2) The use, operation, or possession is for educational or learning purposes under the supervision of local board of 74 75 education personnel.
 - (3) The use, operation, or possession occurs during an emergency threatening the life or safety of the student or another person.
- (d) No later than July 1, 2025, each local board of 79 education shall adopt a wireless communication device policy. 80 81 The wireless communication device policy shall include



- 82 consequences for violations. The local board of education
- 83 shall reasonably distribute the wireless communication device
- 84 policy to students, parents, faculty, staff, and the State
- 85 Board of Education.
- Section 4. (a) No later than July 1, 2025, each local
- 87 board of education shall adopt an Internet safety policy that
- 88 addresses student access to the Internet on devices owned by
- 89 the local board of education.
- 90 (b) The policy shall do all of the following:
- 91 (1) Limit Internet access by students to only
- 92 age-appropriate subject matters and materials deemed
- 93 age-appropriate pursuant to the policy.
- 94 (2) Provide specific procedures and other protections
- 95 that prioritize the safety and security of students when using
- 96 email, chat rooms, and other forms of direct electronic
- 97 communication.
- 98 (3) Prohibit access by students to unlawfully obtained
- 99 data or information, including hacking, and other unlawful
- 100 online activity by students.
- 101 (4) Prohibit access to websites, web applications, or
- 102 software that exposes students to the disclosure, use, or
- 103 dissemination of their personal information.
- 104 (5) Prohibit students from accessing social media
- 105 platforms, except when expressly directed by a teacher solely
- 106 for educational purposes.
- 107 (c) The principal shall be responsible for ensuring
- 108 consistent compliance with the policy by school personnel.



- Section 5. (a) Each certificated staff member employed by
 the local board education shall complete an annual written
 anonymous survey regarding the implementation of the wireless
 communication device policy and to measure uniform compliance
 within the school.
- (b) On or before October 1, 2025, the State Department of 114 115 Education shall develop a survey to assess the levels of 116 participation and compliance with the wireless communication device policy. On or before June 1, each subsequent year, the 117 annual survey results shall be submitted by the principal to 118 the local superintendent of education, local board of 119 education, and the State Board of Education for publication on 120 the website of the State Department of Education. 121
- Section 6. Section 16-40-13 is added to the Code of
 Alabama to read as follows:
- 124 \$16-40-13
- (a) No later than July 1, 2025, the State Department of
 Education shall develop and approve an asynchronous, digitally
 delivered course that addresses the risks of using social
 media and how to use social media safely.
- (b) At a minimum, the course shall include the following topics:
- 131 (1) The benefits of safely using age-appropriate social
 132 media platforms, including career and resume building for
 133 future academic or employment opportunities; sharing
 134 information with family and friends; and safely connecting
 135 with other users with similar interests.




136 (2) The risks of social media use including its negative 137 effects on mental health, including addiction; the 138 distribution of misinformation on social media; how social 139 media manipulates behavior; and the permanency of sharing

materials online.

- 141 (3) Safe practices for using social media including how
 142 to report suspicious behavior; how to identify cyberbullying,
 143 phishing and scam communications, predatory behavior, and
 144 human trafficking; and maintaining personal security and
 145 preventing oversharing of personal information.
- 146 (c) The State Department of Education shall make the course available online and each local board of education 147 148 shall reasonably notify parents of its availability. Each 149 local board of education shall deliver the course to all students prior to entering the eighth grade and shall make the 150 151 course available to students in grades eight through 12 who transfer to the school district or who otherwise have not 152 153 completed the course.
- 154 (d) The State Board of Education may adopt rules to 155 implement this section.
- Section 7. Section 16-1-27, Code of Alabama 1975, providing for the use of electronic communications devices on school property, is repealed.
- Section 8. This act shall become effective immediately.
