16	Section 1. The Legislature finds that there is a
17	critical shortage of skilled tradesmen in the residential
18	construction industry in Alabama and that this shortage has a
19	direct and negative effect on housing affordability.
20	Section 2. (a)(1) Any county or municipality that has a
21	permitting and inspection program for residential
22	construction, by resolution or ordinance adopted by a majority
23	of the total membership of the local governing body, may levy
24	an additional fee of up to twenty dollars (\$20), in addition
25	to any other fees authorized by law, for the issuance of any
26	permit connected to the construction of a residence or
27	structure as defined in Section 34-14A-2, Code of Alabama
28	1975.



- (2) For the purposes of this section, the term permit includes, but is not limited to, building permits, mechanical permits, plumbing permits, electrical permits, or any combination of the foregoing, and any other permit required for the construction or remodeling of a new or existing residence or structure as defined in Section 34-14A-2, Code of Alabama 1975.
- (b) All fees collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the Alabama Construction Trade Academy Fund established in Section 34-14A-20, Code of Alabama 1975.

- (1) Mobile demonstration units that show the various systems of a structure and how they interconnect.
 - (2) Tool and supply grants for public and private educational providers that provide construction trade education.
 - (3) Incentives for newly established construction trade education courses, with priority given to carpentry courses.
 - (4) Adult education initiatives that provide continued learning opportunities through mobile training facilities or distance learning opportunities with priority focus on those serving underserved areas and widely offered trainings.
 - (5) Any other proposal that in the opinion of the board



- would address the need for construction trade education in the state.
