4 To make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year  
5 ending September 30, 2026, from the Opioid Treatment and  
6 Abatement Fund to the entities and for the purposes herein in  
7 the amount of \$43,138,650; and to transfer \$5,000,000 that was  
8 appropriated from the Opioid Treatment and Abatement Fund to  
9 the Department of Mental Health in Act 2025-255 of the 2025  
10 Regular Session for a dedicated opioid treatment center to the  
11 Department of Public Health and appropriate those funds to the  
12 Department of Public Health for the same purpose.

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

14 Section 1. There is hereby appropriated from the Opioid  
15 Treatment and Abatement Fund the sum of \$43,138,650 for the  
16 fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, to the entities and for  
17 the purposes specified herein:

18 (1) To the Board of Pardons and Paroles for additional  
19 recovery and facility services at CARE in Thomasville and PREP  
20 facility modifications, \$1,500,000;

21 (2) To the Department of Mental Health, \$26,360,000. Of  
22 this amount \$2,000,000 shall be used for Medicaid State Match;  
23 \$1,000,000 shall be used for residential detox; \$1,000,000  
24 shall be used to purchase Naloxone; \$4,000,000 shall be used  
25 for the 988 Crisis Line; \$8,930,000 shall be used for  
26 prevention, treatment, and recovery grants; \$7,500,000 shall  
27 be used for co-occurring civil commitment beds; \$1,300,000  
28 shall be used for the continuation of the statewide marketing

29 campaign; \$500,000 shall be used for adolescent substance  
30 abuse treatment; and \$130,000 shall be used for medical  
31 medicine education by the Alabama Society of Addiction  
32 Medicine;

33 (3) To Auburn University for the expansion of the  
34 Harrison College of Pharmacy, K-12 Opioid Prevention Program,  
35 \$1,900,000;

36 (4) To The University of Alabama at Birmingham for the  
37 Psychiatry Residency Program, \$2,000,000;

38 (5) To the USA Health University of South Alabama for  
39 Safer Prescriptions and Diversion Reduction Campaign, EMS  
40 Hotspot, and 211 Integration support, \$1,100,000;

41 (6) To the Administrative Office of Courts for  
42 Specialty Courts, \$3,000,000;

43 (7) To the District Attorneys to be allocated equally  
44 to each district, \$2,100,000;

45 (8) To the Child Advocacy Centers for counseling  
46 sessions, family advocacy sessions, and forensic interviews,  
47 \$2,136,650;

48 (9) To the Office of Prosecution Services for school  
49 resource addiction awareness, and jail support for opioid  
50 treatment of inmates, in cooperation with the Alabama  
51 Sheriff's Association, \$1,092,000;

52 (10) To the Department of Forensic Sciences to increase  
53 lab capacity and purchase of additional fentanyl detection  
54 instrumentation, \$450,000;

55 (11) To the Department of Senior Services for Seniors  
56 and Grandparents Programs, \$500,000; and

57 (12) To the Department of Corrections, \$1,000,000. This  
58 funding shall be used to support four initiatives: (i)  
59 expansion of medication-assisted treatment (MOUD) for  
60 incarcerated individuals in work release and general  
61 population settings; (ii) enhancement of recovery services  
62 through evidence-based electronic programming and telehealth  
63 counseling, requiring investment in software and devices;  
64 (iii) implementation of harm-reduction measures by providing  
65 Naloxone to individuals upon release; and (iv) expansion of  
66 substance abuse classes through distance learning.

67 Section 2. (a) For the fiscal year ending September 30,  
68 2026, the \$5,000,000 that was appropriated to the Department  
69 of Mental Health from the Opioid Treatment and Abatement Fund  
70 in Act 2025-255 of the 2025 Regular Session to be used to  
71 establish a dedicated opioid treatment center shall be  
72 transferred from the Department of Mental Health to the  
73 Department of Public Health.

74 (b) In addition to all other appropriations heretofore  
75 or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated for the fiscal  
76 year ending September 30, 2026, the \$5,000,000 transferred to  
77 the Department of Public Health in subsection (a) to  
78 establish a dedicated opioid treatment center using the  
79 Therapeutic Community Treatment Model through an RFP.

80 Section 3. All funds appropriated in this act not  
81 expended in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, shall  
82 not revert, but shall be carried forward for the purpose  
83 appropriated.

84 Section 4. This act shall become effective June 1,
