This bill makes a conditional appropriation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, from the Education Trust Fund to the Executive Commission on Community Services Grants, and to the Lieutenant Governor for the K-12 Capital Grant Program in the total amount of \$29,998,245 and makes supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, from the Education Trust Fund to various agencies and entities in a total amount of \$651,202,906.

AN ACT

To make a conditional appropriation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, from the Education Trust Fund to the Executive Commission on Community Services Grants, and to the Lieutenant Governor for the K-12 Capital Grant Program in the total amount of \$29,998,245 and make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, from the Education Trust Fund to various agencies and entities in a total amount of \$651,202,906.



29 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

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30 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations 31 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated 32 \$29,998,245 from the Education Trust Fund. Of this amount, 33 \$15,000,000 shall be used for the K-12 Capital Grant Program, pursuant to Section 29-4-51, Code of Alabama 1975, to provide 34 35 grants to eligible school systems to assist with capital 36 projects, deferred maintenance, or technology needs, conditioned upon HB415 or another bill being enacted in the 37 2024 Regular Session repealing the Distressed Institutions of 38 39 Higher Education Revolving Loan Program; and \$14,998,245 shall be used for the Executive Commission on Community Services 40 41 Grants to be distributed pursuant to Section 29-2-123, Code of 42 Alabama 1975.

Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a total of \$651,202,906 from the Education Trust Fund to the following agencies and entities for the purposes specified below for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024:

- (1) To the Department of Finance, Division of Risk Management, for the State Insurance Fund, \$5,000,000.
- (2) To the State Board of Education Local Boards of Education, \$94,224,918. Of this amount, \$13,839,874 shall be used for ASIMS; \$15,000,000 shall be used for purchases of new buses based on the current age and mileage of existing buses as recommended by the State Superintendent of Education and approved by the Governor; \$10,000,000 shall be used for Career Tech O&M to expand support for CTE through the purchase of



equipment, consumables, and supplies; \$25,000,000 shall be
used for core-adoption textbooks; \$22,229,387 shall be used to
fund the current school nurse matrix; and \$8,155,657 shall be
used for unanticipated Foundation Program shortfalls.

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(3) To the State Department of Education for one-time expenses, \$63,800,000. Of this amount, \$400,000 shall be used for the Birmingham Education Foundation; \$15,000,000 shall be used for summer reading camps to support literacy attainment; \$17,000,000 shall be used for College and Career Readiness grants to continue expansion of support for activities that increase students' awareness of postsecondary opportunities; \$4,000,000 shall be distributed to the Teacher's Liability Trust Fund; \$5,000,000 shall be used to develop programs for struggling readers beyond grade 3; \$2,500,000 shall be used for Ed Farm; \$9,000,000 shall be used for a grant program for charter schools with funds to be allocated among the schools on a per pupil basis and used for the same purposes allowed for the Advancement and Technology Fund appropriations pursuant to Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975; \$2,000,000 shall be used for Plasma Games curriculum; \$6,650,000 shall be used for capital projects at the American Village; \$700,000 shall be used for the Wooley Institute for Spoken Language (WISE); \$500,000 shall be used for Small Magic school readiness programs; \$175,000 shall be used for the Symphony in Education Program; \$300,000 shall be used for the 1st Grade Readiness Pilot Project; \$75,000 shall be expended for the Youth Entrepreneurial CEO Program; and \$500,000 shall be used by the Department of Education for an educational technology



85 assessment pilot program that will provide six public school 86 systems with a local inventory dashboard of education software 87 programs used by their students and teachers. The pilot 88 program shall compile usage data by educator and student, conduct rapid-cycle evaluations to measure the effectiveness 89 90 of education software programs based on student outcomes, and 91 support evidence-based analysis of education software programs 92 aligned to the required levels of evidence in the Every 93 Student Succeeds Act. Public school systems voluntarily participating in the pilot program shall be provided 94 95 request-initiated workflows for educational technology procurement and adoption that allow for the assignment of 96 97 internal district reviewers along with teacher and staff 98 feedback. Of the above amount, \$6,000 shall be reserved for 99 the Alabama Leaders in Educational Technology (ALET) to assist the department in selecting voluntary school district 100 101 participation, managing the pilot program, and preparing an 102 interim and final report on the pilot program. 103

(4) a. To the Department of Commerce for one-time expenses, \$8,300,000. Of this amount, \$2,450,000 shall be used for the Talent Triad; \$5,000,000 shall be used to support a Biotech Workforce Center in Birmingham; and \$850,000 shall be used to engage a third-party entity to conduct a statewide assessment of Alabama's key economic development-related infrastructure along targeted growth corridors in the state. The statewide assessment shall encompass, but not be limited to, the following infrastructure components:

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1. Transportation infrastructure, including road, rail,



- 113 air, and sea transportation systems;
- 2. Digital infrastructure, including high-speed
- 115 Internet and advanced telecommunications infrastructure;
- 3. Utilities infrastructure, including gas and electric

- Education Savings Accounts; and \$1,000,000 shall be used for

- 137 (6) To the Alabama School of Healthcare Sciences in
- 138 Demopolis for one-time expenses, \$15,000,000. This
- 139 appropriation is contingent upon the Alabama School of
- 140 Healthcare Sciences Foundation adopting a policy or plan that



- recognizes and protects, to the extent practical, this

- 173 (13) To Athens State University for one-time expenses 174 for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, 175 or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects, 176 \$5,750,000.
- (14) To Auburn University, \$28,675,000. Of this amount, 177 \$25,450,000 shall be used for one-time expenses for increasing 178 179 research capacity, deferred maintenance, renovation of 180 existing facilities, or ongoing capital projects; \$3,000,000 shall be used for the McCrary Institute; \$175,000 shall be 181 182 used for Eagles Wings; and \$50,000 shall be used by the 183 College of Veterinary Medicine for a mobile veterinary 184 medicine partnership.
 - (15) To Auburn University at Montgomery for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects, \$5,250,000.

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- (16) To Jacksonville State University, \$12,700,000. Of this amount, \$12,000,000 shall be used for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects; and \$700,000 shall be used for the Paint Rock Forest Research Center.
- 195 (17) To the University of Montevallo for one-time 196 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing



- facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects, \$9,250,000.
- 199 (18) To the University of North Alabama for one-time 200 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing 201 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital 202 projects, \$14,000,000.
- 203 (19) To the University of South Alabama, \$23,000,000.

- 209 (20) To Troy University for one-time expenses for 210 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or 211 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects, 212 \$14,250,000.
- (21) To the University of West Alabama, \$11,750,000. Of this amount, \$11,500,000 shall be used for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects; and \$250,000 shall be used for the Biodiversity Center.
- 218 (22) To Tuskegee University for one-time expenses for 219 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or 220 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects, \$5,000,000.
- (23) To the Alabama Community College System for one-time expenses, \$110,340,057. Of this amount, \$25,000,000 shall be used for the Alabama Energy Infrastructure Training Center at Bevill State Community College; \$3,000,000 shall be

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used for a truck driving training track at Jefferson State Community College; \$900,000 shall be used for the Northwest Alabama Workforce Training Center; \$27,640,057 shall be used for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects; \$800,000 shall be used for the Mobile Area Education Foundation; \$18,000,000 shall be used for the Alabama Centers for Rural Healthcare per Act 2023-378, of which \$3,000,000 shall be used to complete the North Alabama collaborations; and \$35,000,000 shall be used to establish a Capital Fund for ongoing deferred maintenance and capital project needs of community colleges. (24) To the Council on the Arts, \$2,428,000. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 shall be used for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital projects at the Shakespeare Festival; and \$1,428,000 shall be used for the facilities grant program. The Council of the Arts may award grants from the facilities grant program for projects that build, renovate, restore, preserve, or enhance arts facilities in Alabama, including performing arts centers, art museums and galleries, multi-purpose arts centers, artist residency facilities, and outdoor performance venues. Eligible entities include: (i) 501(c)(3) nonprofit arts organizations chartered in Alabama, active and in good standing with the Internal Revenue Service and the council; or (ii) an entity of local government. Grant amounts shall not exceed \$100,000 to any one entity, with the first grant being reserved for the Princess Theater for the Performing Arts for \$75,000.



(25) To the Alabama Department of Public Health, \$7,450,000. Of this amount, \$5,000,000 shall be used to coordinate with The University of Alabama at Birmingham for the establishment of a North Alabama rural dental clinic residency program; \$250,000 shall be used for Lions Sight eye screenings; and \$2,200,000 shall be used for the Medical Education Consortium for the expansion of the primary care physician pipeline for rural and underserved Alabama.

- (26) To the Lieutenant Governor for the K-12 Capital Grant Program pursuant to Section 29-4-51, Code of Alabama 1975, to provide grants to eligible school systems to assist with capital projects, deferred maintenance, or technology needs, \$15,000,000. Any K-12 entity awarded a grant pursuant to the program shall be allowed to amend their original grant proposal if necessary to allow full utilization of the funds awarded for an eligible purpose.
- (27) To the Department of Agriculture and Industries for educational programs at Landmark Park, \$250,000.
- (28) To the Firefighters' Personnel Standards and Education Commission/Fire College, \$1,400,000. Of this amount, \$1,200,000 shall be used for an aerial apparatus; and \$200,000 shall be used for the Volunteer Firefighter Training Program.
 - (29) To the Alabama Commission on Higher Education, \$13,920,000. Of this amount, \$4,000,000 shall be used for the Deferred Maintenance Program for Historically Black Colleges and Universities in the state with no matching fund requirements by the institution receiving a grant; \$2,500,000 shall be used for the Birmingham Zoo Alabama Veterinary



281 Teaching Hospital; \$270,000 shall be used for the Best and 282 Brightest STEM Pilot Program pursuant to the provisions of Act 283 2020-204; \$850,000 shall be used for the EarlyWorks Museum in 284 Huntsville; \$250,000 shall be used for the NCAA Women's 285 Basketball Tournament; \$250,000 shall be used for the 286 Para-Cycling Road World Championship; \$500,000 shall be used for the SEC Baseball Tournament; \$100,000 shall be used for 287 288 Selma University; \$200,000 shall be used for the Southern 289 Museum of Flight; \$500,000 shall be used for the USS Alabama 290 Battleship; and \$4,500,000 shall be used for the ReEngage 291 Alabama Grant Program pursuant to Act 2023-539. (30) To the Historical Commission, \$5,200,000. Of this 292 293 amount, \$75,000 shall be used for the Jesse Owens Memorial; 294 \$75,000 shall be used for the Helen Keller Foundation; 295 \$800,000 shall be used for the Community Foundation of 296 Northeast Alabama for one-time capital outlay expenses for 297 Remington Hall at the former Fort McClellan; \$950,000 shall be 298 used for Historic Blakeley Authority; \$100,000 shall be used 299 for Blacksmith Forge in Loachapoka; \$200,000 shall be used for 300 Historic Coppinville School Park in Enterprise; \$50,000 shall 301 be used for the Harrison Brothers Hardware Civil Rights Site; 302 \$75,000 shall be used for Lafayette's Visit Commemoration; 303 \$250,000 shall be used for the Historic Looney's Tavern 304 Theater renovation; \$575,000 shall be used for the Historic 305 Old State Bank renovation; \$50,000 shall be used for Pratt 306 City Historic signage; and \$2,000,000 shall be used for the Clotilda Project. 307

(31) To the Legislative Council for the construction
