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4 SYNOPSIS:

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5 This bill would establish the School Security 6 Program within the State Department of Education, to 7 require periodic inspections of school facilities at 8 public K-12 schools.

9 This bill would provide criteria for school 10 security inspections and would require each local board 11 of education to be graded based on its compliance with 12 the criteria.

13 This bill would establish the School Security 14 and Fire Safety Fund within the State Department of 15 Education to provide grants to qualifying local boards 16 of education for the purpose of seeking compliance with 17 school security criteria and recommendations of the 18 state Fire Marshal related to fire safety.

19This bill would establish the School Mapping20Data Program within the Alabama State Law Enforcement21Agency (ALEA) to provide accurate maps for each school22in this state.

This bill would provide parameters for school mapping data and would require the data to be shared with various law enforcement and public safety agencies.

27 This bill would also require the State Board of 28 Education to adopt rules to implement and administer

| 52 | BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: |
| 53 | Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as |
| 54 | the School Security Act. |
| 55 | Section 2. For the purposes of this act, the following |
| 56 | terms have the following meanings: |



57 (1) ALEA. The Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency. 58 (2) BOARD. The State Board of Education. 59 (3) DEPARTMENT. The State Department of Education. 60 (4) SCHOOL. Any public K-12 school. 61 (5) SCHOOL FACILITY. Any building operated in 62 connection with a school including, but not limited to, those 63 housing classrooms, administration, or athletic facilities. 64 Section 3. (a) (1) There is established the School 65 Security Program. The board shall adopt rules to implement and administer the program pursuant to this act. 66 67 (2) The board shall require that at least once every five years, the school facilities under the jurisdiction of 68 each local board of education shall be inspected by at least 69 70 one school security inspector to determine the compliance of 71 the school facility and the local board of education with the school security criteria established pursuant to subsection 72 73 (b).

74 (b) (1) The board shall establish criteria for school 75 security inspections. The criteria shall be established in 76 consultation with the department's regional school safety 77 coordinators and any other entities or individuals as 78 determined by the board. The criteria shall include a rubric 79 that school security inspectors must use to evaluate each 80 school facility during an inspection. The rubric shall 81 include, but not be limited to, standards for each of the 82 following:

- a. Security cameras.
- 84 b. Alarm systems.



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c. Locks on exterior and interior doors.

d. Emergency escapes.

e. Any other physical measures used to strengthen the
security of school facilities and school grounds, including,
but not limited to, criteria related to intrusion detection,
fencing, and windows.

91 (2) The board shall periodically review and update the
92 criteria and rubric to ensure that both accurately reflect
93 current best practices relating to school security.

(c) Inspections under this chapter shall be completed 94 95 by one or more school security inspectors. The board shall adopt rules relating to the selection of school security 96 97 inspectors. School security inspectors shall be neutral and 98 nonbiased individuals with some background experience relating 99 to school security or school facilities, as determined by the board. Possible school security inspectors include, but are 100 not limited to, retired law enforcement officers. A regional 101 102 school safety coordinator may not be a school security 103 inspector but may attend school security inspections for the 104 purposes of reviewing the accuracy and currentness of school 105 security criteria and rubric.

(d) (1) Following an inspection, the school security inspector who conducted the inspection shall provide each school facility with a school security letter grade. The school security inspector shall also provide each local board of education that he or she inspects with a cumulative school security letter grade and recommendations to improve school security.



113 (2) A school security letter grade may be an A, B, C, D, or F. An "A" grade shall indicate the highest level of 114 115 compliance with the school security criteria, while an "F" 116 grade shall indicate a failure to comply. 117 (e) (1) The School Security and Fire Safety Fund is 118 created within the State Department of Education. 119 (2)a. The board may award grants to local boards of 120 education to assist those local boards in complying with the 121 school security criteria established pursuant to subdivision 122 (b). 123 b. The board may award grants to local boards of education to assist those local boards in complying with fire 124 safety recommendations made by the state Fire Marshal or his 125

126 or her assistants, as defined by Section 36-19-3, Code of 127 Alabama 1975.

(3) A local board of education that receives a grant from the fund shall ensure that the expenditure of any grant funds will be used to improve school facilities in compliance with the state building code and rules adopted by the board, including rules related to school facilities.

133 (4) The board shall develop an application form and 134 adopt procedures for the administration of the fund, including 135 for the development of application criteria. The board shall 136 prioritize local boards of education that received a 137 cumulative letter grade of "D" or "F" rating following its school security inspection and local boards of education that 138 have completed a facilities assessment through the 139 140 department's regional school safety training program.



141 (5) Any monies appropriated shall be budgeted and 142 allotted pursuant to the Budget Management Act in accordance 143 with Article 4, commencing with Section 41-4-80 of Chapter 4 144 of Title 41, Code of Alabama 1975, and only in the amounts 145 provided by the Legislature in the general appropriations act 146 or other appropriations act.

147 Section 4. (a) A School Mapping Data Program is 148 established within the Homeland Security department of ALEA to 149 provide accurate maps of each school in the state for use in 150 the case of an emergency. ALEA shall adopt rules to implement 151 and administer the program pursuant to this act.

(b) (1) ALEA shall collaborate with local boards of education to collect accurate mapping data for each school in this state. School mapping data shall include accurate floor plans of each school overlaid on current, verified aerial imagery of the campus and shall meet all of the following requirements:

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a. Be oriented true north.

b. Be verified by the entity producing the data foraccuracy by a walk-through of school buildings and grounds.

161 c. Contain site-specific labeling that matches the 162 structure of school buildings, including room labels, hallway 163 names, and external door or stairwell numbers and locations of 164 hazards, critical utility locations, key boxes, automated 165 external defibrillators, and trauma kits.

d. Contain site-specific labeling that matches the
school grounds, including parking areas, athletic fields,
surrounding roads, and neighboring properties.



e. Be overlaid with gridded x and y coordinates. (2) Updates to school mapping data shall be completed as deemed necessary by ALEA. Any updates to school mapping data shall be accessible within software platforms used by the local, county, state, and federal public safety agencies that provide emergency services to the specific school.

175 (c) School mapping data shall be provided to each local 176 board of education, local law enforcement agency, and public 177 safety agency for use in response to emergencies. For the purposes of this section, emergencies include, but are not 178 179 limited to, any event in which one or more law enforcement officers, firefighters, rescue squads, emergency medical 180 181 services providers, public safety telecommunications, or other 182 emergency management provider may respond.

(d) (1) School mapping data shall be compatible with software platforms used by local, county, state, and federal public safety agencies that provide emergency services to the school for which the data is provided. School mapping data shall be compatible with security software platforms in use by the public K-12 school for which the data is provided.

(2) School mapping data shall be available in a printable format and, if requested by a public safety agency, local law enforcement agency, or local board of education, be in a digital format that may be integrated into interactive mobile platforms in use.

(e) No entity including, but not limited to, a law
enforcement agency, local board of education, or public safety
agency, may be required to purchase additional software or pay



197 a fee to view or access school mapping data through the School 198 Mapping Data Program.

Section 5. This act shall become effective on October 1, 2024.
